It is no secret that a number of very important conferences have been indulged in by leading representatives of the government during the past forty-eight hours. The cabinet members have been active. Everything clus-ters around the proceedings in the debate on the bribery charges this after-noon. That important developments are anticipated by both sides is certain. Mr. J. W. In that event the investigation may begin al-most immediately. Otherwise the date of the opening trial is quite uncertain, but in any event it is remote. In the meantime many sensational incidents are developing to heighten the interest. Mr. Gamey announces that detectives are constantly watching him, one evening going to the point of breaking in-to his room at midnight. Their purpose, he says, he can only surmise. At the same time the supposition is that measures are being taken to prevent important witnesses suddenly departing. Mr. Stratton's Version of Bribery Case As Published By the Paper He Owns

View of Eminent Jurist. Ottawa, March 15.—(Special.) —The World, in conversation with an eminent jurist to day, obtained from him an expres-sion of opinion adverse to the referring of the Gamey charges to a commission of judges. 




