There will be three classes—a free-for-all, a 2:30 and a 3 minute race, for which \$350 in prizes is offered. The purses are just double what the association offered last year.

A GREAT RACE.
Cincinnati, O., June 10.—Plaudit met his first defeat of the season yesterday in the Latonia Derby, after one of the keenest contests ever witnessed on the western turf. Han d'Or is the colt that lowered the colors of the maiden pride, and in doing so he also lowered the world's record for a mile and a half. Ten thousand people cheered Han d'Or as he came down the stretch like a wild horse. Martin was whipped, and riding like a demon, Plaudit made a gallant effort to come on, but it was of no use. Han d'Or crossed the line a winner by three lengths, amid excitement. No race run at Latonia ever created more enthusiasm.



The track was fast and all conditions favored good time. There were but two starters, and little time was lost in getting them away. Han d'Or at once set out to make his own pace. The first half-mile was covered in 59 seconds, the six furlongs in 1:14 1/2, seven furlongs in 1:27 1/2, a mile in 1:40 1/2, and an eighth in 1:54, and the mile and quarter in 2:07 1/2, the final time being 2:24 1/2, which is a quarter of a second better than any previous record. Han d'Or led for three lengths until the stretch was reached, when Plaudit tried to make his run, but the killing pace held on him and he failed. Plaudit was 1 to 7 in the betting, while as good as 5 to 1 could be had on Han d'Or. The Derby is worth \$7,000 to the winner, which is the property of George A. Slingerly. The other winners were Komarski, Harry Par-due, Boardmaker, Beana and Gid Law.

The Railways.

Sir William Van Horne Coming to Canada.

G. T. R. Earnings Keep Up—Sleeping-Car Mails.

Earnings of the Grand Trunk Railway system from May 22 to 31, 1898, \$386,132, same period in 1897, \$382,672; increase in 1898, \$3,460.

Sir William Van Horne, president of the C. P. R., who is at present in England, will sail for New York by the Lucania on Wednesday, the 15th inst., and will probably reach Montreal, via New York, on the 23rd.

Sleeping-car mails are the latest luxury provided by enterprising American railway companies for the comfort of women travelers. Like stewardesses on ocean steamships, they will doubtless soon be so indispensable as to make railroad passengers wonder why the innovation was so long delayed.

The Indian department has secured a warehouse on the C. P. R. track at Winnipeg to be used for distributing all the supplies to be sent out to the various Indian reserves. Major McGibbon, of Port Qu'Appelle, will be in charge for a month. Formerly the warehouse was in Regina. The treaty payments will start on July 1.

The mileage operated directly by the Pennsylvania Company is 1,075 miles. Total revenue for 1897 was \$2,325,259.40. Less amount paid for interest on bonds, general expenses, taxes, etc., \$1,225,438.17, leaving a profit for the year of \$1,099,821.23. An increase as compared with 1896 of \$771,554.54. There was an increase of 4,348,456 tons in the freight traffic of the north-west system. The number of passengers carried on the lines operated directly decreased 544,107.

The Grand Trunk Railway have laid about 46 miles of new track in the Niagara Falls and Hamilton. There are still 80 miles to be laid in the southern division and 40 miles of new rails are expected this week. A new double track is now under construction just west of St. Catharines. About 39 of the latest style of passenger coaches have been commenced in the G. T. R.
