Apples Balls With a Mixture of Fruit.

Peel large apples, with a potato scoop cut out small balls, dropping them into water with a little vinegar added to keep them white. Prepare a mixture of grapefruit pulp, pineapple and banana and put into glasses; add a few of the apple balls, pour over all the juice left from the fruit, which has been boiled down to a sugar. Cool and serve at once, or the apples may turn brown.

Cook red apples in bolling water until soft. Have the water half surround the apples, and turn often. Remove skins carefully, that the red color may remain, and arrange on serving dish. To the water add one cup of sugar, grated rind of one lemon and juice of one orange; simmer until reduced to one cup; cool and pour over the apples. Serve with cream sauce.
