

FLOW OF NEW WELL IS 200,000 GALLONS

Front Street Supply Welcome Addition to the City's Resources.

Two hundred thousand gallons of water a day is hoped for from the new well on Front street, which the public utilities commission is testing. Electric centrifugal pumps have already brought forth a flow of 150,000 gallons, the pump is being lowered today, and the increased volume may result.
