WAS SENT FOR A DOCTOR BUT GOT DRUNK INSTEAD

Twins, Born Without Medical Assistance and Man's Wife Died—Warrant For Arrest.

PETERBORO, Feb. 28.—(Special).—Mrs. R. Lindsay died under peculiar circumstances at her home near Tweed this week. It appears that Lindsay was sent for a doctor on Saturday morning. Mrs. Lindsay was in a very critical condition, but he decided that he would combine business with his trip and drove a cow to Bridgewater to sell. He succeeded in selling the cow, but got drunk and went to Tweed and continued his spree without notifying a doctor of his wife's illness.

On Monday Mrs. Lindsay, who was left alone with a young son, gave birth to twins and was without aid until the boy ran to the nearest neighbors, over a half mile away, and before help arrived the woman died.

Coroner Dr. Farrell was summoned on Tuesday and held an inquest. The circumstances surrounding the death of Mrs. Lindsay were discussed, and the jury was summoned for Wednesday and continued for a week in order to consult with County Crown Attorney Anderson. They decided the circumstances warranted the holding of Lindsay and a warrant has been issued for his arrest.

AGAINST HARROW TRUSTEES

Judge Hears Evidence—Four Charges Abandoned.

WINDSOR, Feb. 28.—(Special).—Judge McHugh heard evidence this afternoon in quo warranto proceedings against Messrs. Ferriss, Clark and Zimmerman, village trustees of Harrow. The relator is Frank Sinasac, who sat as trustee last night. The main issue was over the connection of defendants with J. A. Secord, formerly of Toronto, who is now proprietor of the electric light company which supplies Harrow with street lighting. Before Secord took office the concern was not a paying venture, and the present trustees, several other Harrow citizens, lent financial assistance. Two years ago they disposed of the plant to Secord, but the indebtedness to the trustees and others has not been cleared. Several witnesses were called, but there was no evidence to show that the trustees profited by Secord's contract with the village. Arguments will be heard Tuesday as to whether the position of trustees as creditors will prevent them serving out their respective terms.

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ADVICE FOR WOMEN WHO WANT BEAUTY

Pretty Face Not Necessarily an Expensive Possession—Egyptian Beauty Method.

"Many a woman," said the physical culturist, "would like to begin the beauty quest, but the trouble is that she does not know how to make a start. She is afraid it is too expensive, that beauty, like everything else worth having, comes high."

"But the woman who is really in earnest and wants to improve her appearance can do a great deal without spending any money at all, or at least any more than she is accustomed to spend."

"It is not necessary to begin by laying out large sums. She will need a little jar of finely powdered pumice stone, which is cheap and one of the best of all toilet requisites. For five cents she can get enough to last a year."

"Then she will want a little box of borax powder, and here again a nickel will do a great deal for her. And as she goes along fitting up her toilet shelf she will find that it is rather knowledge of what to buy than plenty of money that is essential to the upkeep of a pretty face."

"There are many women who have good features but have let the face become full of blemishes. To make the face look like new is the function of the beauty expert, but the amateur who does not want to spend much money can manage very nicely for herself without a beauty doctor."

"The main trouble is that the skin gets clogged, and the first step is to wash one's face in the waters of the Nile, but a woman can go thru the same process with domestic water."

"For such a woman it is best to begin by a good rubbing of the face with pumice and very hot water. It is not necessary to take the skin off, but the rubbing will remove the dirt and then lathered and rubbed again."

"A spraying of hot water will remove both sand and dirt, and leave the skin glowing and pretty. It now needs nothing but a coating of skin food to make it as fair as any one would desire."

"If the patient is a stout woman the physical culturist will advise her to leave off coffee in the morning and to drink nothing at all with her breakfast. An hour before breakfast she can take a cup of hot water and at 11 she can take another cup of hot water. But she must make her breakfast and her lunch entirely without drink of any kind."

"Getting thin below the belt line is the most important thing to the woman who has let herself go. In most cases the fat settles in the chin also. Unless her belt is small and her chin shapely she is out of the running from beauty's standpoint."

"To begin massaging the chin is one of the steps in the first day's work. The improvement process will be visible day by day. Even at the end of twenty-four hours the change is noticed."

"To make a quick change from ugliness to beauty is what most women want. They desire the services of a fairy godmother to whisk them to the younger and prettier than they really are. And the fairy godmother will do it for them if properly entreated."

"A young woman who makes up her customers for the occasions was hastily called before a recent wedding to prepare a woman to the altar. The patient, a woman of 40, was to be one of the guests next day."

"I must look young and pretty to-morrow," she said. The young beauty expert looked upon her and sighed. The patient's skin was rough and red and her eyes had a watery look, her hair was like burnt hair and the very expression of her face was drawn and weary."

"Make faces while I massage your skin," said she. And then she laid a mirror in front of her, and the patient saw her own face. She drew her mouth in hideous snarls and brought each muscle into active play. Meanwhile she scrubbed her complexion and massaged.

"Then there was the hair question. For the hair was dank and of many colors. There was nothing to do but shampoo it quickly in scented water and to dry it under a scented cap. Occasionally the cap was lifted and the hair was ventilated."

"I took a couple of hours, but at the end of that time the girl was shining and lovely in tone. It was slightly faded from the sun, but this faded look only gave it the fashionable London tinge, which is that of a delicate tanning from pale yellow to deep brown."
