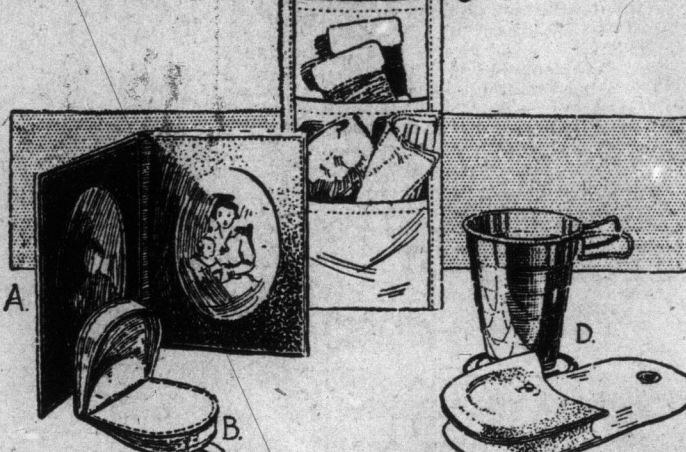

You may have any of the valley, or roses with ribbon twining in and out of the stems—2 by 2 1/2 yard table cloth, with one dozen napkins 22 inches square, at \$16.75 the set. Or you may have chrysanthemums with a dotted centre the centre of the cloth, not of the napkins. Or, if any of these designs, then one of maple leaves and a satin stripe, at \$11.75 the set for a cloth 2 by 2 1/2 yards, and dozen napkins 20 inches square. All are in border effects with plain centres—made of Irish linen satin damask of beautiful glossy finish. What think ye? . . .

**K. L. C.**—A dark brown costume, with the accent on the boots—Is that the idea? Well, you'll get a very smart pair in chocolate color kid, high laced tops, Louis heel and wadded soles, for \$14.00. In fact, there is a good boot of this description at \$8.00. As for the suit, would you prefer serge, gabardine or broadcloth? All materials to be had in nigger brown, the broadcloth, \$2.75 a yard, and the other two, \$2.50. They are 48 inches wide. Making the shirt narrow and the sleeves tight. I suppose you should top the costume with a brown fox scarf and a little cap of a brown or black velvet hat, with a silk tassel or fur ball languishing down over one ear. . . .
