## CATTLE MARKET WAS JUST ABOUT STEADY

All the Small Stuff Was Slow.

With 2300 cattle on sale the demand was weak for all classes excepting heavy steers and choice butchers, and a few choice weight butchers were slow of sale. A large percentage were held over unsold. A fair demand for good and choice butchers, cows, medium and common cows were hard to sell.

For milkers and springers there was a fair inquiry for the better grades. In the bull trade the demand was limited to a few good heavy bulls. Altogether the market was weak and a large percentage was left unsold.

**Sheep and Lambs.**  
With a fair run of sheep and lambs all classes sold lower except the choice lambs, which were steady. Choice lambs sold at \$12.50 to \$13.00; common, \$8 to \$10. Choice yearlings, \$10 to \$11; choice light handy sheep, \$8 to \$9.50; choice sheep from \$4 to \$5. The market for sheep and lambs closed with a good many unsold, mostly sheep.
