## TRANSFERS DUTIES OF CROWN COURTS

A person charged with a crime punishable by death shall include as a member of the court one person (who need not be an officer), nominated by the lieutenant, being a person certified by the lord chancellor of Ireland, or the lord chief justice of England, to be a person of legal knowledge and experience, and regulations under the principal act may be made accordingly.

Regulations so made may also: (a) Provide that a court of summary jurisdiction, when trying a person charged with a crime, or with an offence against the regulations, when hearing and determining any application with respect to a recognizance, shall, except in the Dublin metropolitan police district, be constituted of two or more resident magistrates, and that a court of quarter sessions, when hearing and determining an appeal against a conviction of a court of summary jurisdiction for any offence, shall be constituted of the recorder or county court judge sitting with two magistrates.

(b) Confer on a court martial the powers and jurisdiction exercisable by justices or any other civil court for binding persons to keep the peace or of good behavior, and for enforcing recognizance, for compelling persons to give evidence and to produce documents before the court.

(c) Confer on persons authorized to summon witnesses before a court martial, the power of issuing warrants for compelling persons to attend as witnesses, and any warrant so issued shall have the like effect and be enforced in the like manner as if issued by a justice of court of summary jurisdiction, having jurisdiction in the place in which it is executed or sought to be executed.

(d) Authorize the imposition by courts martial of fines in addition to or in substitution of any other punishment for offences against the regulations, as well as for crimes and provide for the manner in which such fines are to be enforced.

(e) Authorize the conveyance to and detention in any part of His Majesty's prisons in any part of the United Kingdom, of any person upon whom a sentence of imprisonment has been passed in Ireland, whether before or after the passing of this act.

(f) Provide for any of the duties of a coroner or any coroner's jury, being performed by a court of inquiry constituted under the army act instead of by the coroner and jury.

(g) Provide that where the court house or other building in which any court has been unusually held is destroyed or rendered unfit for the purpose, the court may be held in such other court house or building as may be designated by the lord lieutenant.

(h) Authorize the trial without a jury of any action, counter-claim, civil bill, issue, cause or matter in high court or a county court in Ireland, which apart from this provision would be triable with a jury.

(i) Provide for the retention of sums payable to any local authorities from the local taxation (Ireland) account or from any grant or from any fund administered by any government department or public body where the local authority has in any respect refused or failed to perform its duties, or for the purpose of discharging amounts awarded against the local authority in respect of compensation for criminal injuries or other liabilities of the local authorities, and for the application of the sums so retained in or toward the purpose aforesaid.

(j) Any such regulations may apply either generally to the whole of Ireland or to any part thereof, and may be issued at any time, whether before or after the termination of the present war, and the principal act shall continue in force as far as may be necessary for that purpose, and the regulations may contain such incidental, supplemental and consequential provisions as may be necessary for carrying out the purposes of this act, and shall have effect as if enacted in this act.

(k) In this act, unless the context otherwise requires, the expression, "crime," means any treason, felony, misdemeanor or other offence punishable whether by indictment or on summary conviction by imprisonment, or by any greater punishment, and the expression "offences against the regulations," shall include a person who has entered into a recognizance conditions to appear and plead to an indictment or to take his trial upon any criminal charge, or who has been committed to prison there to await his trial for any crime.

(Continued From Page 1.) conducted without either him or a substitute.

According to the revised statutes of Ontario, 1914, chapter 22, section 9, sub-section 1, "the number of jurors to be summoned to serve on an inquest shall be no less than seven and not more than twelve." With a view to discovering the latest ruling on such matters, The World asked the advice of the afore-mentioned authority, who stated that it was absolutely irregular for a coroner's jury to act without a foreman. He further explained that a recent amendment to the quoted act states that the jury must be composed of (as a minimum) six jurors and one foreman. This ruling, he says, renders last night's verdict entirely null and negligible. Before the jury retired to consider their verdict, the coroner told them that they could please themselves whether they should elect a foreman or manage without one. On their return they stated that they had not elected a foreman.

The coroner took nearly an hour to sum up the evidence last night, and read all the testimony given by witnesses at previous sittings. He also quoted the law governing the driving of vehicles in "public thoroughfares to a considerable extent, at the same time defining such legal terms as "negligence" and "manslaughter." # BOLHSEVIKI MAKE LITTLE PROGRESS

Are Waiting for Ammunition Before Making a Dash for Warsaw.

Paris, Aug. 6.—The fate of Warsaw still hangs in the balance. The latest news reaching Paris tonight, which was somewhat sparse, indicates that the Bolsheviki are making little progress, that the impulse which carried them forward continuously during the past week has spent itself, but that they apparently are gathering force for a fresh onslaught.

Military observers here still cherish the hope that the situation may yet be saved. Advice received by the French foreign office from the Polish front give the impression that there has been a lull in the fighting and a stabilization of the line during the past two days. The enemy artillery apparently is short of ammunition, and there has been delay in bringing up guns and shells to a position from which they can be rushed for the final dash to within shelling range of Warsaw. Airplane scouts over the Red line report a heavy movement across the Bug river of stores of ammunition, guns and materials of all kinds by the enemy.

Several squadrons of cavalry are reported to have been bivouacking on the same spot for the past 24 hours resting.

## JAPAN IN MARKET FOR CANADA'S WHEAT

Winnipeg, Aug. 6.—Canada will find a new market for wheat in Japan, now that the Russian market, Japan's foremost base of supply, is closed, according to F. Fujita of Kobe, Japan, who is in Winnipeg in the interest of produce business, which he represents.

There is a big market for Canada wheat in the east if it grasps the opportunity, he declared. "It is of the utmost importance to both countries that they maintain a friendly relationship."

## SOCCER HEAD RESIGNS

Brampton, Ont., Aug. 6.—(Special)—President Tom Anderson of the local soccer league, has addressed in no uncertain terms to the executive of the league his formal resignation of office. This, despite the award of the investigation committee which ordered the Trans club to pay all expenses of Player Scanlan, attacked by a Paris mob and seriously injured. Failing which, President Anderson's suspension of the Paris club is to remain.
