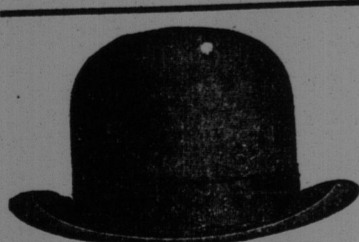

Royal mail steamship Empress of Ireland now on her way to Liverpool from this port took away a cargo valued as follows: Canadian goods \$102,157, foreign goods \$139,850. Total \$242,007. Among her cargo were 45,705 bushels wheat, 1,003 boxes cheese, and 1,733 boxes United States meats. The latter are worth \$106,448.

MILITARY VETERAN DEAD

Joseph Kelly, Who Saw Service in the Fenian Raid, Died Early This Morning

Joseph Kelly one of the oldest citizens of this city, and a Fenian Raid veteran, died at his home, Brussels street, at an early hour this morning. Mr. Kelly, who was an employe of the city corporation, was at work yesterday, the end coming as a result of heart trouble. He was a native of County Antrim, Ireland, and came to St. John in 1862, during the time of the Trent affair. Mr. Kelly saw service at the Fenian Raid and received the medal for that occasion. He is survived by his wife, who was Miss Sarah Crozier, five sons and three daughters. The sons are Joseph, Robert J., Albert, and George, all of St. John, and the daughters are Mrs. Harry Leonard, also of this city, and Minnie and Edith at home. Mr. Kelly had been a pensioner since 1880.
