GOING AFTER THAT GRANT

St. John Delegation Leaves for Ottawa Tonight to Urge for Dominion Exhibition Grant.

A. O. Skinner, president of the Exhibition Association, C. B. Allan, of the directors, and Mayor Bullock, will leave this evening for Ottawa to press St. John's claims for the grant of \$30,000 for the Dominion exhibition in 1910. They will be joined in Ottawa by W. F. Burditt, a member of the exhibition directorate and board of trade, who is at present in Smith's Falls.

The delegation will take with them a number of copies of a comparative statement of the hotel and railway facilities of Chatham and St. John to lay before the government. The delegates expect to return on Friday.

PASSENGERS COMPLAIN

Men Who Left on Boston Train Yesterday Morning Have Grievance Against C. P. R.

A number of passengers who left here yesterday on the early morning Boston train, bound for Fredericton, are complaining about the manner in which they were used by C. P. R. officials.

According to the story told, the engine of the Boston train broke down when the train was within a mile of Fredericton. A message was sent to St. John asking that another engine be sent up, and in the meantime the train came in from Fredericton and left on its return here without any effort being made to take the passengers from the stalled train just below the station. The Fredericton passengers who had to wait for the engine of the Boston train might have been backed down and the disabled train hauled in to the Junction as it would have taken only a few minutes to do it and the passengers could then have reached the capital at 9:30 instead of waiting as they were compelled to, until an engine came from St. John and pushed them to the station. After which they waited for the Fredericton train and finally arrived at their destination at 12:30.
