SOCIÉTÉ EN MASSE AT A BRILLIANT WEDDING IN OLD STONE CHURCH

Miss Helen Chipman Robertson Daughter of James F. Robertson Becomes the Bride of Hugh Aubrey Holmes—A Brilliant Scene at the Church

A wedding is at all times a subject of interest to the people, though appealing mostly to the women, and the nuptial event of today has awakened more than ordinary interest in society circles, as the contracting parties are so well known and have so many friends.

The Holmes-Robertson wedding has been looked forward to for a considerable space of time as the society event of the season, and a visit this afternoon to St. John's Old Stone Church, where the ceremony was performed, would seem to confirm this view.

Gorgeous and costly costumes of delicate hues and patterns on stately dames and fair damsels made the scene one of unusual brilliancy.

The Contracting Parties

Hugh Aubrey Holmes, the groom, is a son of Colonel J. G. Holmes, of Victoria, B. C., D. O. C. of the Pacific slope, including Esquimalt and other important posts. He was formerly connected with the Canadian Bank of Commerce in this city, but is now manager of the Summerside, P. E. I. branch.

The bride, Miss Helen Chipman Robertson, is the youngest daughter of James F. Robertson, president of Manchester, Roberson, Allison Limited, and is one of St. John's most popular young ladies. She has always been an earnest church worker and has been interested in many branches of mission and charitable endeavor. In the social circle also she has always been a prominent figure, and what St. John loses will be Summerside's gain.

The Church Thronged

The hour set for the wedding was 3.30 o'clock, but long before that time the space allotted to the general public at the sides of the church was filled with an eager expectant throng. As the time for the nuptial rite drew near, the invited guests, of which there were about one hundred and fifty, began to arrive, and they were ushered to the seats along the centre aisle, which had been reserved for their accommodation.

Fred R. Taylor, Beverly R. Armstrong, William C. Allison, and Harry Newman, of Montreal, acted as ushers.

Some of the Dresses

Among the many elaborate and handsome costumes noted was that worn by Mrs. James F. Robertson. It was a white gown of Irish lace, trimmed with violet velvet. Her hat was white, with deepening white ostrich plumes and buckles of violet. She carried a bouquet of violets tied with purple tulle.

Mrs. Richard Marpole, of Vancouver, B. C., a sister of the groom, wore a green velvet costume with a hat of corresponding shade and sable fur trim.

Mrs. T. E. G. Armstrong, sister of the bride, was gowned in grey iridescent Dresden silk, trimmed with blue velvet, and wore a hat with white ostrich plumes and pink roses.

Mrs. (Dr.) W. A. Curry, of Halifax, a sister of the bride, wore a round gown of crope-de-chine adorned with lace of the same tint and a yoke of fine net. Her hat was trimmed with white ostrich plumes.

Mrs. H. F. Puddington, a sister of the bride, had a blue grey gown over blue silk, trimmed with white lace, and a white hat with ostrich plumes.

A Brilliant Scene

As the guests were assembling and just prior to the bride's entrance some introductory music was played, including the hymn "O, lead us Heavenly Father," was sung by the full choir.

As the bride and her retinue advanced down the aisle to the entrance to the chancel the scene presented was one of the prettiest nuptial pictures ever witnessed in a St. John church. The happy and expectant faces bore witness to the deep interest in the entire proceedings.

Arriving at the chancel rail they joined the bridegroom, who was supported by Thomas B. Blair.

The Bride's Gown

It was noted that the bride was wearing a handsome Princess gown of white satin with point d'Alencon lace and embroidered tulle. The dress was very gorgeous, the entire bodice being composed of rare old lace as was also the flounce on the skirt.
