BASEBALL MANAGER KILLS WATER IN ROW OVER SUGAR
Indianapolis, Ind., May 4.—Daniel Shay, manager of the Milwaukee American Association baseball team, was held on the charge of murder today, following the shooting of Clarence Euell, a negro waiter in a cafe. The shooting followed an argument over a piece of sugar.
Police today were searching for a woman who was with Shay at the time of the shooting, but who disappeared. Shay at the police station refused to admit that there was a woman with him or that he was rendered and the boys went through the ceremony of raising and saluting the flag, followed by three cheers for His Majesty the King.
More than 100 scouts and scout officers in Great Britain and Ireland have won honors and have been decorated with medals during the last six months. The honors include one C.B., twenty-eight military crosses, forty-six military medals, five D.S.O.'s, twelve D.C. medals, one certificate of merit, and in addition, three medals in despatches and four mentioned in despatches and one given a certificate for bravery. Another scout received a military medal, D.C.M., and the Russian order of St. George.

The scout naturalist is also something of an artist, for in qualifying for the badge he is required to make colored drawings of flowers and sketches of animals. Most scouts thoroughly enjoy this part of their training and some really excellent drawings have been made by scouts in every province.
Steamer Floated
The Dominion Coal Company's steamer "Maskinonge," which grounded on the Russell bed to the south of the Ballast wharf recently, was successfully floated on Saturday night. About a dozen tugs, the government steamers Aberdeen and Dollard and another coal boat, the Louisbourg, all assisted in hauling her off the beach to deep water. After she was freed from her precarious position she was towed to No. 1 berth, Sand Point, where she will remain until arrangements are made for the discharging of her cargo, which consists of 7,000 tons of coal.
