PRODUCE PRICES

(Hartland Observer)
Farmers report yields of good potatoes all the way from forty to eighty barrels per acre, while 100 barrels is considered a big crop in the country. They have been coming to market rather freely and around 82 has been the prevailing price. The crop will total about as last year. Farmers will not name a selling price, and there are as yet no serious attempts to buy. It is believed that oats touched the top price last season. Butter is being hoarded for a wartime profit by many farmers, and wage-earners in the village this week paid fifty cents a pound for it. Eggs reached the fancy price of forty. As high as twelve cents has been paid for live pork and beef is correspondingly high. Lambs have been bringing \$8 to \$10 and more.
Wood is being held for \$15 by some and \$15 by others.

EQUITABLE MAY MUTUALIZE

New York, Sept. 28.—The application for a temporary injunction to restrain the Equitable Life Assurance Society from carrying through its proposed plan of mutualization pending trial of the suit for a permanent injunction has been denied by Judge Hough of the federal district court. The complaining minority stockholders are the Royal Trust Company and the executors and trustees of the estate of Sir William C. Van Horne.

CONTROLLER FOR IRON AND STEEL?

Canadian Plants Face Serious Difficulties As Result of U. S. Embargo on Export of Metals

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—The serious situation developing in Canada in consequence of the United States embargo on the export, except under license, of pig iron, iron and steel plates, crank nickel steel, boiler tubes, steel billets, tin plate and other materials of iron and steel manufacture was discussed today with the minister of trade and commerce, Sir George E. Foster, by a representative delegation of Canadian iron and steel manufacturers. The Washington embargo prevents the importation into Canada of these basic requirements of the basic manufacturing industry unless it is shown they are necessary for munitions or other warlike purposes.

The increased war order business of the United States has placed an increased strain on the limited supplies of these materials, and Canadian difficulties in securing iron and steel material from across the border are now greater than ever.

The shortage of raw material for manufacturing output for domestic use threatens to cause a temporary shutting down of some plants or at least a restricted output and short shifts that.

Relation To Causing of Mental And Other Diseases

Public Health Meeting

Dr. W. H. Hattie's Address At Ottawa Gathering—The War And The Manhood of Canada—Tubercular Soldier Costs \$1,200 to \$1,300 a Year

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—That it was time Canada woke up and put the ban on mental defectives entering the country to enjoy the full rights of citizenship was the main point of one of several admirable papers presented at the closing session of the annual congress of the Canadian Public Health Association yesterday afternoon.

Captain W. H. Hattie, M.D., of Halifax, provincial health officer of Nova Scotia, submitted one of the finest papers of the congress on "some medico-social problems arising out of the war." He called attention to the death or disability in the war of men best fitted to father a vigorous and virile generation and the serious effect this will have on the birth rate of Canada and the stock quality of the next generation.

He pointed out the terrible toll of young Canadian manhood taken by the war and referred to the seriousness of the problem of replacing these precious young men in a country so badly needing population. He referred with satisfaction to the fact that the war had not adversely affected the birth rate of Canada or the gradually reducing infant mortality rate. Captain Hattie said there was some uneasiness caused by the impression that there had been an increase in crime and
