U-BOAT WIT WINS FAME

Known Only as "Kelly," He Plays
Pranks on Allied Patrol

Base American Flotilla in British Waters, Oct. 16—There is a German submarine commander who is known throughout the American flotilla as "Kelly." His real name is something quite different, but the German sailors promptly dubbed him "Kelly" of the Emerald Isle, and the name will stick in the songs and stories of the navy as long as the great war is talked about. "Kelly" earned his Irish name by his display on various occasions of a rich vein of quill-an-German humor. He has become the hero of the numberless stories told in forecabin and on quarterdeck. Not all of these stories are true, and probably most of them have grown in the telling. All that The Associated Press can vouch for is that "Kelly" is a real individual and that there is some foundation for the remarkable tales of his exploits. "Kelly" commands a mine-laying U-boat, which pays frequent visits to the district patrolled by the American destroyers. When he has finished his appointed task of distributing his mines where they will do most harm, he generally devotes a few minutes to a prank of some kind. Sometimes he contents himself with leaving a note flying from a buoy, scribbled in schoolboy English, and addressed to his American enemy. On other occasions he picks out a deserted bit of coast line at night, and goes ashore with a squad of his men for a saunter on the beach, leaving behind a placard or a bit of German bunting as a reminder of his presence. His most audacious exploit, however, is the legend of the forecabin are to be believed—was a trip which he made several months ago to Dublin, where he stayed two days at a leading hotel, afterward rejoining his U-boat somewhere up the west coast. He is said to have informed the British of his exploit by leaving his receipted hotel bill attached to one of his buoys. Still another of "Kelly's" more recent stunts was to plant the German flag on a rising on the coastline. It was the first time that the British and Americans knew just where the German flag had set foot, and they shared the excitement of the village folk who avoike one morning to find a new kind of flag flying.

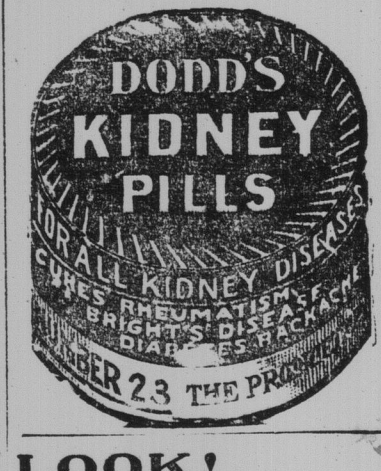

SUIT DISCLOSES STAR'S CONTRACT

Public Learns Anita Stewart's
Guaranteed Salary is \$127,000
a Year—Five Years Ago it Was
\$1,200

(From the Billboard)
New York, Oct. 27.—So much is said about the salaries of motion picture actors and actresses that the revelations made during the recent sale of the Vitaphone Company of America against Anita Stewart are secondary in importance only to the result of the suit itself. These revelations show that Miss Stewart, under the terms of her contract with the Vitaphone Company, is one of the highest paid individuals in the world, her guaranteed salary for a year being \$127,000. In the original bill of complaint, Vitaphone told the history of Miss Stewart's connection with the company, starting in with her first appearance at the studio in Brooklyn in August, 1912. At that time, it was declared, Miss Stewart was unknown in acting or posing and her salary was not much more than \$25 a week. She was schooled along, however, and her natural talent, combined with an enormous expenditure for advertising, said by the company to amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars, soon made her one of the most popular motion picture stars in the world. Thus, when it came to the point of making a new contract last January, Miss Stewart was provided with a fixed salary of \$10,000 a week and royalties of ten per cent. on all her productions, those royalties being guaranteed to be not less than \$75,000 a year and bringing her total revenue up to \$127,000. It will thus be seen that in a space of less than five years Miss Stewart's salary jumped from about \$1,200 a year to more than 100 times that sum. Another interesting feature of the contract, a copy of which was attached to the Vitaphone bill of complaint, was that dealing specifically with Miss Stewart's services to the company. This was that, with the exception of certain specified periods, such as illnesses, Miss Stewart was to make up any time lost by her to the period of her engagement. The Vitaphone bill, or that part of it made up of the affidavit from President Smith, contained an interesting sidelight on how a motion picture star can spring up overnight if given the proper vehicle. It recited that Miss Stewart first showed her exceptional talent in a feature called The Wood Violet, and her talent was so distinctive in that that she was given a starring vehicle. A Million Bid. This feature was produced at the Vitaphone Theatre in New York, now the Criterion, and in the words of President Smith, "Anita Stewart became a star of huge magnitude overnight." As briefly mentioned in last week's Billboard, The Vitaphone Company won its suit which was brought against Miss Stewart and Louis B. Mayer of Boston. Justice Edward G. Whitaker, in Part 1, of the Supreme Court of New York, handed down a decision, granting the plea of Albert E. Smith, president, and the Vitaphone Company, for an injunction against Miss Stewart and Mr. Mayer, which prevents her from acting for any corporation or individual other than the Vitaphone Company. They are restrained from advertising or announcing that Miss Stewart is to work for any other company or individual, and Louis B. Mayer is specifically enjoined from "enticing," inducing or causing the defendant, Anita Stewart, to fall or refuse to work in the employ of the plaintiff, and is further enjoined from employing her.

This decision is one of the most important ever handed down in the motion picture industry, and, in reality, marks the first successful effort of a manufacturer to hold a big star to a contract when the latter sought to get away. Justice Whitaker's decision was handed down after both sides had presented voluminous affidavits and complete arguments in court, a significant feature being that the court did not make a written decision.
