MONROE DOCTRINE BUT BLUFF THAT SECOND RATE POWER COULD CALL

Justice Ford Says Uncle Sam Impostor Who Never Won Good Fight and 'Can't Fight Worth a Damn'

(New York Tribune)

Poor old Uncle Sam! Cartoonists picture him as tall, lean and determined, hard of face and staid of eye—a wiry, capable old party from his bowler hat to the striped trousers strapped under his boots.

And Uncle Sam could use them all for fuel, according to Justice Ford, of the supreme court, who addressed the Queens County Bar Association at the Hotel Biltmore last night.

Those chin whiskers that gentlemen from the rural districts have been proud to emulate for years past do not belong to him at all, according to the justice. "He has never had a first class fight in his life," the speaker asserted.

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"The Monroe Doctrine," declared Justice Ford, "has become merely an American bluff, and its second rate power could call with impunity."

On the evening of Wednesday last in the Baptist church at Mount Whatley, Miss Alma Carter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Carter and James Millard Hastings of Amherst were united in marriage.

UNITED LEADERSHIP IS NEED OF CANADA

"Ralph Connor" Makes Stirring Appeal for a National Government

Must Still Make War—Declares Peace Without a Victory is an Absolute Impossibility—Faith in Quebec

(Toronto Star)

"There is no great victory in Canada today calling 'This is the way; follow me.' What Canada needs at this moment is a great man who can lead all the people and point out to them their full duty to this war. The name of such a leader would live forever."

In these words, Major Rev. Dr. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) pointed out the lack of leadership, the needs of a national government, in an address delivered at the luncheon of the Empire Club, this afternoon.

"We want a united, steady, resolute leadership—nothing soft, slack—and with no disunion," he continued. "All parties, all classes, should be represented in that leadership. It is your business as it is mine to find out how we can get that leadership."

Major Gordon referred to the example shown by ex-Premier Asquith and ministers to stand aside when the needs of the country demanded that the strongest man of the empire should be given a place in the British ministry.

"That's what we want to see in Canada," Major Gordon added; "and instead of that, we have a Presbyterian today as Conservatives, as Liberals, or as labor men, but as citizens of a great empire, whose cause they desire to see triumph."

Hope for Quebec

Alluding to the view that Quebec was an obstacle to the success of recruiting in Canada, Major Gordon expressed the belief that some way would yet be discovered for Quebec to come into this war and do her full duty. Credit should not be withheld from Quebec for what that province had done. Among the deeds of shining glory which would be spoken of after this war was over, would be the gallant work of the 22nd Battalion composed of French-Canadians.

It was unfair to blame the Roman Catholic church in Quebec for existing conditions. The Roman Catholic chaplains were performing a service at the front which completely refuted this view. Major Gordon paid tribute to the clergy who have been in the military service, and the chaplains to the needs of the dying on the battlefield. He said that a Presbyterian chaplain, having buried their dead as they have buried mine. They have given devotion to mine as I have to theirs.

Major Gordon, discussing President Wilson's peace suggestions, declared confidently that we could win victory without an absolute impossibility. Britain was not fighting for glory or revenge. "We have the military glory we need to carry us down the sounding ages," he said. "Nor are we fighting for revenge. Yet we cannot disregard the great outstanding stupendous fact of injury inflicted upon unoffending nations. Belief that we are not fighting against another war. Honor demanded that we stick to the job till the work was done, and honor demanded that we stayed at work until peace was secured."

Break the Sword.

"If the heart of Germany is bent on war, we must break the sword in Germany's hand so that she cannot pick it up and strike again. The power to effect her dream of world domination, and to again use that deadly instrument against us," said Major Gordon. "Until the sword of war is broken in the hand of Germany, it will not be safe for us to consider the making of peace."

If an inconclusive peace was made, Canada would stagger under the business of building navies and raising armies for the next one hundred years. "What then are we to do?" he asked. "To say that for the present we must not talk war but make war. Canada was pausing about making war because it was not recruiting men in the large numbers that they are needed.
