Battle of Ballots at Grand

Reginald Howard Keddy, formerly of Nova Scotia, but lately of Grand Bay, and Howard A. Lingley, Liberal chairman for the Grand Bay polling district, were fined \$25 each before Magistrates Joseph Thompson and George W. Crawford, on Saturday on charges of personation during the recent Dominion election.

It was charged that Keddy had voted in the name of William M. Flannagan and that Lingley had taken him to the booth and asked him to vote. Both pleaded guilty and were fined.

Keddy, after pleading, said that Lingley had come to him on election day and asked him to vote the name of William M. Flannagan, saying that he should have a vote although his name was not on the list. He had thought he should have a vote and had gone with Lingley to the booth. He knew he was wrong, but he did not think it was a serious matter.

He went to the booth and voted. After he came out, Charles Stevens, agent for George B. Jones, Conservative candidate, had him arrested. On Keddy's information, Lingley was also arrested.
