FALL FAIR AGAIN SHOWS SURPLUS

Directors are Elected and Reports Presented at Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Exhibition Association of the City and County of St. John, was held in the offices of the manager, Horace A. Porter, Prince William street, last night. There was a good attendance and, in the absence of President E. J. Terry, Vice-President George D. Ellis occupied the chair.

Reports were received and referred to the shareholders. There were also reports from the secretary-treasurer, the auditors, and President Terry. All reports were most satisfactory, and where the year showed an overdraw of \$800 guaranteed by the city, the Association had been able to pay this off without calling on the city and now has a sufficient balance in the bank with which they can go along with the show for 1924.

A vote of appreciation was extended to President Terry, who has held office for the last three years.

Special reference was made to the excellent work accomplished by G. W. Frost, superintendent of grounds. This did not end in mere words but was accompanied by a substantial bonus.

Mr. Porter, in addition to his report on the year's work, told of his trip to Brockton, Mass., and to the National Dairyman's Show at Syracuse, N. Y. He spoke of some of the features that might prove good at the St. John show in 1924.

A Good Showing
At the end of 1921 the Association was in debt to the amount of about \$4,000, with only about \$1,000 in the way of bills receivable to offset it. During the last two years this amount has been entirely cleared off without any assistance whatever from the City Council. With the exception of a grant made to the Association by the City when the shows were resumed in 1920 after the war period "holiday," the city has not been asked to vote a cent for the operation of the St. John shows.

An invitation was received from the Federal Minister of Agriculture, Hon. W. R. Motherwell, through the livestock Commissioner, H. S. Arkell, to have the St. John Association represented at a meeting of the Canadian Fairs Association to be held at Ottawa, Nov. 28 and 29. Mr. G. C. P. McPherson and Mr. Porter were authorized to attend the meeting.

The following members were elected to the board of directors: E. J. Terry, George D. Ellis, G. C. P. McPherson, Walter C. Allison, William S. Allison, W. F. Burditt, F. A. Dykeman, Capt. A. J. Mulcahy, R. R. Patchell, F. B. Schofield, R. O'Brien, John Thornton, LeBaron Wilson, Garrett W. Wilson, Commissioner T. H. Bullock, Clive Dickson, A. E. Everett, A. L. Porter, Mrs. H. L. Lawrence, R. D. Paterson and G. L. Warwick. These 17 members will assemble in the near future for the purpose of electing ten additional members to complete the directorate, and then the total number will elect the officers.

COUNCIL MAY FIGHT SCHOOL TAX CASE

Assessment on Mispic Property is Considered at Meeting.

Notice was served on the City Council yesterday that unless the school taxes for district No. 10, Simonds, were paid at once suit would be commenced for their collection and the members of the council expressed the opinion that it would be a good thing to fight the case out in the courts. The permanent men of the fire department asked for changes in working conditions and the longshoremen asked that an early trip of the ferry be made in the winter months.

The report of the committee of the whole, recommending that the Imperial Oil Ltd. be informed that their application for admission to place pipe clusters in the Courtenay Bay channel should be made to the Dominion Government and that Commissioner Wigmore be given authority to purchase 25 tons of cast iron pipe, was adopted.

Mayor Fisher presented the final report on the city wood cutting operation at Musquash and reported a deficit of \$1,429.50 on the transaction. The amount was ordered paid out of general revenue.

A petition from the permanent men of the fire department asking that they be given one day off in eight instead of 14, as at present, was referred to the Commissioner of Safety.

Local 287 L. A. wrote asking if they would be possible to have the ferry make a trip at 5.30 in the morning during the winter months to accommodate the men who quit work at 5 o'clock. This was referred to the Commissioner of Harbors and Fisheries for a report.

Telephone Rates Next Month.
A communication was received from the New Brunswick Board of Public Utilities that the matter of telephone rates would be considered at the regular meeting of the commission in November, when it was expected the rates would be presented.

A communication from Inches, Weyman and Hansen that they had been retained by the school trustees of school district No. 10, Simonds, in the matter of a bill for \$211, school taxes due by the city to that district.

Commissioner Wigmore said this was on the pulp mill property at Mispic and he had refused to pay for he considered the bill excessive. It had been getting larger every year and paying under protest last year had not done any good. The total assessment for school purposes in the district \$600 and one-third of it was charged to the city. He moved the matter be referred to Commissioner of Water and Sewerage and the city solicitor.

Commissioner Frink said he was glad the communication had come in and he was in favor of having the matter go to court and having a showdown.
Ready to Go to Court.
Commissioner Bullock said he could not understand why the city was picked out for a lawsuit when so many of the rate payers were in arrears.
Mayor Fisher said he hoped Commissioner Wigmore would impress on the city solicitor that the Council were back

of an appeal to the courts to bring the whole matter out into the open, even if the case went against them. The motion carried.
A request from Jules Home Travel Agencies for an advertisement in their tourist guide was referred to the Mayor.

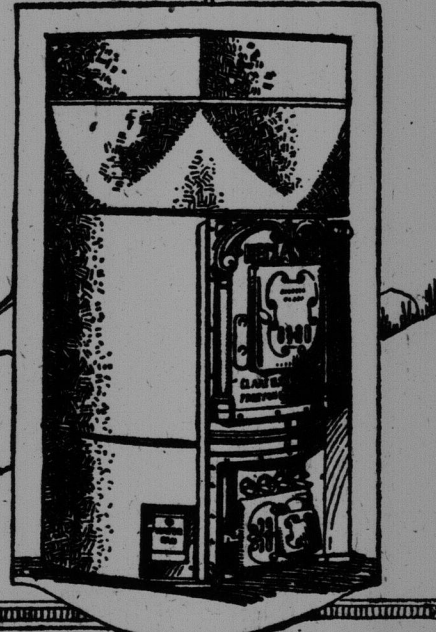

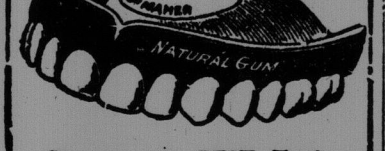

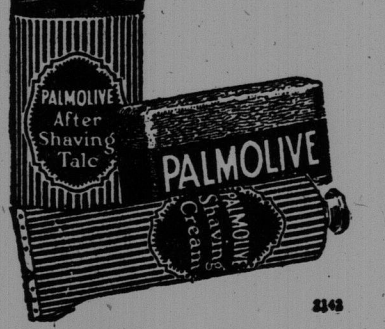
