

LIEUT. HARRISON GIVES HIS LIFE

Private Ernest Willis Also is Among the Fallen Heroes—News of the Soldiers

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 10.—Announcement of the death of Lieut. S. L. T. Harrison, prominent broker and real estate agent of Moncton, and formerly of St. John, was heard here with deep regret. A telegram received here today by his wife, stated that he lost his life September 29. Lieut. Samuel Leonard Tilley Harrison went overseas in 1916. Up to July of this year he has

been engaged on adjutant duty in England. He is survived by his wife and one little daughter, Margaret, and his mother, Mrs. Harrison, at present residing in Moncton at the home of Rev. H. Johnson, pastor of Wesley Memorial church. Lieutenant Harrison was a son of the late Rev. George Harrison, well known Methodist clergyman, and was born at Point De Buie about forty-five years ago, his mother being Miss Margaret Tilley, sister of the late Sir Leonard Tilley, St. John. Lieutenant Harrison's widow is a daughter of the late Dr. G. Ambrose, Digby (N. S.), and also has a son by her first husband, Paul Bragg, overseas, who was wounded a short time ago and is now in hospital at Folkestone, England. Lieutenant Harrison was chairman of the board of assessors in Moncton for several years.

Fourth Son Home. Late Corporal C. G. Howard, son of County Councillor John Howard, of St. Martin's, returned home yesterday with his English bride. He expects to get his discharge soon. Councillor Howard had four sons overseas, all of whom have been returned unfit for further service. Pte. E. Willis.

Private Ernest Willis, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Willis, Golden Grove, has made the supreme sacrifice on the battlefield of France. Official word was received yesterday by his parents from the director of records at Ottawa. Private Willis enlisted with one of the local infantry battalions which was recruited here. Upon arrival in England he was sent to France in a reinforcement draft, presumably to the 20th Battalion. He

enlisted when very young not being more than seventeen years of age. He was a bright lad, popular and well liked and his early death will bring sorrow not only to the immediate members of his family but to his many friends as well. He was a grandson of Squire Willis, well-known mill owner and stockbroker, of Golden Grove.

Word has been received in Sussex that Private Hanford Joseph Geldert was killed in action on September 25. He went overseas with the 104th Battalion. Mrs. Sarah Geldert, of 90 St. James street, St. John, is a sister.

Lieut. Price Dead. Lieutenant John Warren Price, son of Claude W. Price, of Moncton, died at Hamilton, Ontario, last night with Spanish influenza which developed into pneumonia. He saw six months service in France as a member of the aerial force and during that time was mentioned several times in despatches.

Lieut. Col. Murray Home. Lieutenant-Colonel L. R. Murray, of Sussex, returned home yesterday from overseas after an absence of three and a half years. Lieutenant-Colonel Dr. Murray went overseas as medical officer with the rank of major in the 29th Battalion. He was promoted to lieutenant-colonel in France. For the last year he was connected with the Princess Patricia's Red Cross Hospital in Berkhill, England. Wins Decoration.

Major H. S. Jones, of Apohaqui, has been awarded the Colonial Auxiliary Forces decoration. Major Jones entered the service in 1897 as a lieutenant in the 74th Battalion. Major Jones made several attempts to get overseas but was not physically fit. He crossed to England as a company commander in the 55th Battalion.

Father and Son. Among the returned soldiers who arrived in the city recently from overseas, was Shapper T. C. Postle, of Haymarket square. Just prior to his leaving England for Canada he was pleasantly sur-

COMMANDANT'S SUICIDE

Col. Hagadorn Found Shot at Camp Grant.

Camp Grant, Ill., Oct. 10.—Colonel Charles B. Hagadorn, acting commandant of Camp Grant, committed suicide in his quarters at the cantonment. His body, with a pistol wound in the head, was found in bed in the morning. Colonel Hagadorn has been in command of Camp Grant for a month. Officers at the camp said today he had been showing the strain imposed on him by the pneumonia epidemic, which has caused more than 500 deaths in camp. He had been troubled by insomnia. Colonel Hagadorn was drawing instructor at West Point for fourteen years, was military attaché in Petrograd and chief of staff in the canal zone. He was unmarried, and his home was in Elmira, N. Y.
