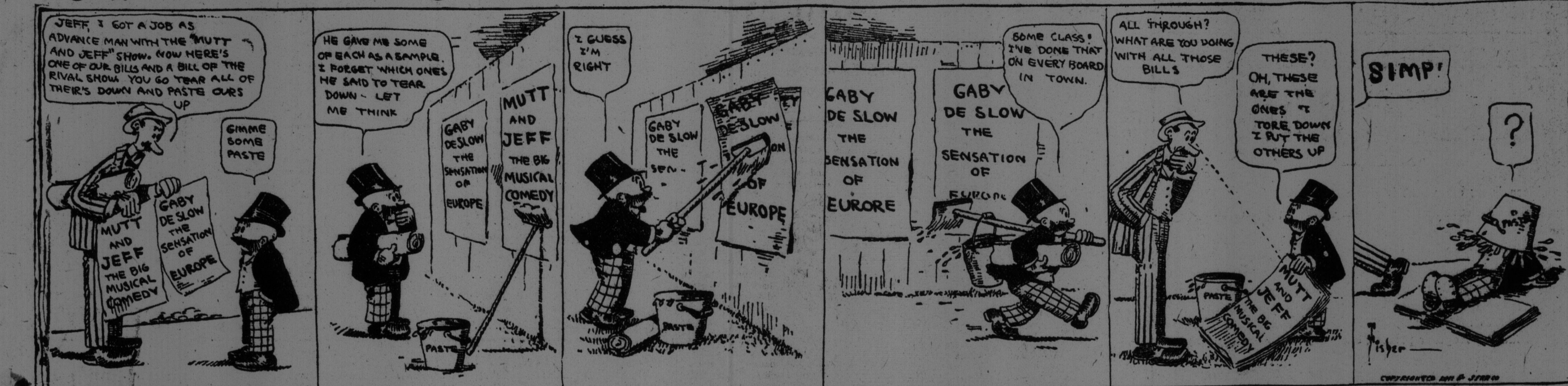


Jeff Booms The Wrong Show
