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SOVIET SEIZES ITALIAN SHIPS

Riga, Dec. 6.—The Russian Soviet Government has closed and sealed the Odessa premises of the Italian Lloyd Triestino and confiscated three of the company's steamers, also goods belonging to Italian merchants. The government declares it will rescind its orders of requisition provided normal commercial activity is guaranteed by Russian representatives in Italy and the orders relative to the sequestration of Russian deposits in Italy are withdrawn.

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
