PLAY-OFF FOR CHAMPIONSHIP OF N. H. L. HAS BEEN ARRANGED

To Hold Firemens and Civic Employees Races and Carnival Tonight

CANADIENS AND ST. PATS MEET IN SEMI-FINALS

First Game Will Be Played in Montreal Tomorrow Night

MONTREAL, March 10.—Canadiens and St. Patricks will meet in the semi-finals for the National Hockey League championship, in a home and home series, totals to count. The first game will be played at the Montreal Forum tomorrow night, according to a decision reached by the Canadiens' management at a meeting of the parties concerned last night. The return game will be played at St. John on Friday night, which is the only date on which ice is available for the play offs at Toronto this week.

If Canadiens Win. Should Canadiens defeat St. Patricks in the semi-finals, they will meet Hamilton in the first game of the finals next Monday, with the second game at Hamilton next Wednesday. If Canadiens are beaten out, St. Patricks will enter the final against Hamilton. Arrangements for the finals will be made between the two clubs, though it is known that if at all possible Hamilton would prefer to play the first game of the finals away from home.

To Play At Arena. There was much speculation as to where the local play off would be staged, with both the Arena and the Forum available. The matter was considered at length at the meeting last night, before the decision was finally cast for the Arena. In this decision the competing clubs will lose in gate receipts several thousand dollars through the loss of the ring with the smaller seating capacity, and will thus prevent thousands who might otherwise have seen the contest, from witnessing the eliminations because of lack of accommodation. On the other hand, the arena is a better place for the game, and it is believed that the Canadiens will be able to enter to those supporters who have followed the team through thick and thin in this winter's campaign.

Last Night's Results. The result of last evening's games were as follows: In Boston the Bruins defeated the Canadiens 4 to 1. In Montreal the Canadiens defeated Hamilton 4 to 1, and in Toronto the St. Patricks shut out Montreal 8 to 0.

BIG BILLIARD MATCH

Tom Nennan, English Champion, to Defend His Title Against Reece.

Tom Newman, champion billiard player of England, and Tom Reece, challenger, have agreed on Burroughes Hall, London, as the place for their title match scheduled for April 15. Reece has gone into training at Harrogate and a special table has been set up for him. Reece was the only one to enter the championship tournament and the result of the coming match is looked upon as more or less of a joke among followers of billiards abroad. The champion won his title in a tournament a year ago when he defeated Willie Smith, the champion of his country, in his entry to the tournament and the committee in charge refused to break the time rule by accepting it.

THE FIRST and most important move in preparation for staging the great Eastern Canada basketball classic in this city has been made, namely securing permission to use St. Vincent's gymnasium, the largest of its kind in Eastern Canada. The gymnasium is owned by Bishop E. A. LeBlanc, who won the gratitude of not only the Trojans, but every lover of sport in the city, by his willingness to cooperate and help make this event a signal success. Walter R. Golding, the energetic manager of the Maritime champions, who was responsible for securing this big event for St. John is loud in his praise for the treatment accorded him. He said "I was never treated more royally in my life when I went to get permission to stage the series in St. Vincent's gymnasium. We were offered full use of the premises on one of the best sporting propositions I ever received, namely that event of it being a financial success we are to give them 30 per cent. of the net receipts and if we only break even or lose any money we are not to pay a cent."

No wonder Mr. Golding is delighted. Now that he has this large gymnasium at his disposal he is able to arrange other details in connection with staging the semi-finals for the Dominion title with the winners of the Ottawa Valley-Province of Quebec title series. If other citizens will help boost sport and co-operate with the Trojans this basketball series should be one of the best ever staged in these parts.

BOSTON ATHLETIC authorities are getting ready for their annual marathon race, which is to be held on April 20. Clarence De Mar of Melrose will wear No. 1 this year as he was the first to enter the big race last spring and also the first to finish. It will be recalled that Victor McAulay of Windsor, N. S., participated last year and made a good showing. Fans throughout the Maritime Province will be interested in McAulay's decision as to whether or not he will take part this year.
