FOR INTERNATIONAL PEACE.

Coming so soon after one of the cruelest wars of history has given way, spectacularly, to peace, the International Peace Congress which opens tomorrow in Lucerne, Switzerland, should be followed with greater popular interest than any of its fourteen predecessors. Never was the world more ripe for a fair consideration of the merits of arbitration as opposed to war. The struggle just closed, though it was conducted on the most humane lines possible to modern warfare, has shocked all thoughtful people by its horrible slaughter and brutality. And, now that it is over, neither of the combatants is satisfied with the results.

Coming at this time the present congress should do much to further the work in favor of an international arbitration system if it does not get lost in the mazes of a rather too comprehensive programme.

An important feature will be the study of the conditions of the establishment of an International Federation, with special consideration of the problems of the guarantee of the autonomy of the nations forming the Federation, the harmonious adjustment and management of their common interests, measures for the promotion of unity, methods of international legal procedure, and the spread of ideas of natural law and morals in the promotion of peace.

The special report and conclusions of the commission appointed to study the problem of a reconciliation between France and Germany will form an interesting subject of discussion. Another part of the deliberations will be devoted to the study of the economic causes of war.

Other important features of the programme are: The alliance of States for the promotion of pacific ends; the civil sanctions of international arbitration; the neutralization of land and water areas; the work of the coming Second International Conference at The Hague; the arrest and reduction of armaments; the creation of a permanent international congress; the fixing of the legal position of neutrals; the rights and duties of neutrals; the organization of an international system of education; the study of how to apply this system to different grades of instruction, to lead to the equalization of courses of study and of diplomas in different countries as well as to the interchange of scholars and students.

The question of creating an international auxiliary language will also be considered. This subject has been considered by several previous congresses, but no satisfactory conclusions were ever reached. It is believed now that the present congress will bring the problem a big step nearer to its solution.

Besides the features already selected on the programme there will be many others which shall suggest themselves in the course of the deliberations of the congress. The delegates are quite confident that the present congress will be far more successful than any of its predecessors, owing to the fact that recent events have prepared the ground for rapid progress in the interest of the international peace movement.

CANADA AND THE EMPIRE.

"There is nothing in it," says the authoritative Telegraph of Sir Gilbert Parker's prediction that Canada must some day choose between separation from Great Britain or closer commercial relations.

And yet this is a world where things remain not in any one stay. There must be progress one way or another. Canada's relations to the empire today are peculiar and uncertain and the tendency is not toward closer union. The recent withdrawal of British ships and soldiers and the recent determination of the Canadian government to look after Canada's land defenses are not evidences of a growing coherence.

The only bond between Canada and the mother country today is sentiment, which, while the strongest of all bonds under sudden strain, is very apt to fray with slow wearing. Little incidents like the Alaska boundary dispute, for instance, wear away a few strands.

For permanent union the various parts of the empire must be knit together by mutual self-interest, such as would be provided by a policy of preferential trade. So cemented the empire would be more than a name and practically indissoluble.

But beautiful from a patriotic and sentimental standpoint as are the present relations and effective as they are in times of national stress when patriotism and sentiment occupy a large place in the popular mind, they are not unchangeable, and the process of change they are at present undergoing is not in the direction of greater strength.

MAN'S HEART REMOVED.

AND BULLET EXTRACTED.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—A Philadelphia dispatch to the Herald says that the removal of a man's beating heart from his body and its replacement after a bullet had been extracted from the region adjacent to it, has been accomplished by the physicians at the Germantown, Philadelphia hospital.

Frank Robinson, 23 years old, of Germantown, was shot on September 7, by policeman Morley while the latter was trying to arrest him.

The bullet entered Robinson's chest on the left side. He was hurried to the Germantown hospital where it was believed his heart had been struck.

Some of the most eminent physicians of the city were called in to consult. Portions of two ribs were removed exposing the heart to view. No evidence of a bullet could be seen. The surgeon with great care partly removed the organ from the body. The bullet was found imbedded in the chest within a fraction of an inch of the heart, upon which it had caused pressure. The heart was then exposed and the ribs returned and covered with flesh. There is every probability that Robinson will entirely recover.
