**"BOB" FITZSIMMONS**  
KNOCKED OUT BY  
**JOHNSON IN 2ND ROUND**

PHILADELPHIA, July 17.—Jack Johnson stopped "Bob" Fitzsimmons in the second round of a six round boxing bout before the Washington Sporting Club tonight. Fitzsimmons did not show a trace of his former prowess, and it is probable that Johnson could have stopped him in the opening round if he had cared to do so. The blow that put Fitzsimmons out was a light right to the jaw. The old man fell to the floor, and as he made no attempt to rise the referee stopped the bout. The hitting which usually follows knockouts of this character was absent, the spectators evidently taking compassion on the former pugilist star.

Referee Keenan refused to act in the ring because he had heard that Fitzsimmons had a badly sprained arm. The manager of the club then entered the ring and watched the uneven match.

In the opening round Johnson tumbled Fitzsimmons when and where he chose, but the latter was unable to even land his famous counters.

**HOME FOR INCURABLES**  
**ANNUAL MEETING**

The Wards are all Full, and There is a Waiting List—Substantial Surplus on Hand—New Members Elected.

The annual meeting of the subscribers to the St. John Home for Incurables was held yesterday afternoon, Dr. T. Walker, president of the board of management presiding. Dr. Walker read the report of the governors.

The report stated that a year ago Miss Betts resigned her position as matron and head nurse and that Miss Mason had since filled the position satisfactorily.

The report shows 28 patients in the home, the same number as a year ago. During the year 12 have entered, 10 have died and 2 were removed. Eleven of the patients are males and 15 females. Seventeen applications were considered, of which 12 were accepted, 4 refused and 1 accepted who has not yet entered the home.

More than 100 applications were received from male patients for the ward but there were no vacancies not any of them were considered.

Every year the cost of running the home grows larger and it becomes quite a serious problem.

The thanks of the board were extended to the medical staff and to the Women's Aid Society.

The report of John V. Ellis, treasurer of the board, shows the capital fund of the home to be \$77,431.15. The receipts for the year were \$5,323.99 and the expenditure \$9,668.42. It also shows that the expense for maintenance is increasing. The thanks of the board were extended to the Bank of New Brunswick for their generosity.

The report of the Women's Aid Society was read by the secretary Mrs. John A. McAvity.

**PIRACY UP TO DATE**  
Dozen Men Hold Up Russian Steamer and Get Off With Good Booty

ODessa, July 17.—The passenger steamer "Odessa" which sailed from here on Saturday for Chort, was held up six miles from port by armed robbers on board, who made a successful raid and escaped.

While the captain and passengers were at supper three pirates overboarded the vessel. Two others stood alongside the wheelman and ordered him to lay his course for Odessa or he should be shot. A dozen others came through the saloon and cabin and secured a cashbox containing \$25,000, which the cashier of the Russ bank and Foreign Trade was taking to Chort, besides \$500 belonging to passengers.

When hearing Odessa the robbers disabled the engine, let off steam, destroyed one of the steamer's boats, launched the two others, and escaped ashore. There is no trace of them.

**STORMS CAUSE DAMAGE.**  
ELKINS, W. Va., July 17.—Cloud-bursts and heavy rains today have caused much damage along the Western Maryland R. R. between Thomas and Elk. Two hundred and fifty feet of the track was washed over the banks of the run between Hamilton and Hendricks, and at the same point there is a thirty foot landslide. All telephone and telegraph wires are down between Parsons and Elk. Rain is still falling and railroad officials fear even greater trouble.
