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### Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six month residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

THE TIDE TURNS.

The evidence of a turning tide towards prosperity came from all quarters. The making of carpets, the growth of tobacco, the preserving and canning of milk, the preserving of fish—these are some of the new industries springing up, while the older ones show a almost all a quickening life. In every detail of the social organization the rising hopes of the people under the new era are reflected. Lands are being drained, roads built, stock and poultry improved, the old wretched cabins supplanted by substantial and comfortable cottages, and, yes, the fact that a window may be sometimes left open with advantage is being grasped. There is, I am sure, more ventilation in the Irish home today than in any previous era; and that means less phthisis and a sturdier human stock.

The thick sprinkling, around the whole circle of the country, of butter factories was one of the most hopeful of signs. The butter factory is a great money-spinner to the small farmer in these days of quick transit and cold storage. It takes the fresh milk from a circle of farmers and at once extracts the cream and churns it to butter under scientific and cleanly conditions. The Irish butter factories are up to date; they are run on co-operative principles, giving to the supplier all the profits, less bare expenses; they are helped to get the best results by the Department of Agriculture, and, as they come to be better patronized, will add enormously to the wealth of the country.

To summarize the general conclusion of a thousand miles through Ireland, embracing every province and almost every county—the land is on the up-grade. The people are turning their faces from the "valley magic shadowing" of politics and settling themselves to reap prosperity from a generous opportunity. Grievances are being forgotten in hopes.
