**FIRST VICTIM OF SUFFRAGETTE**

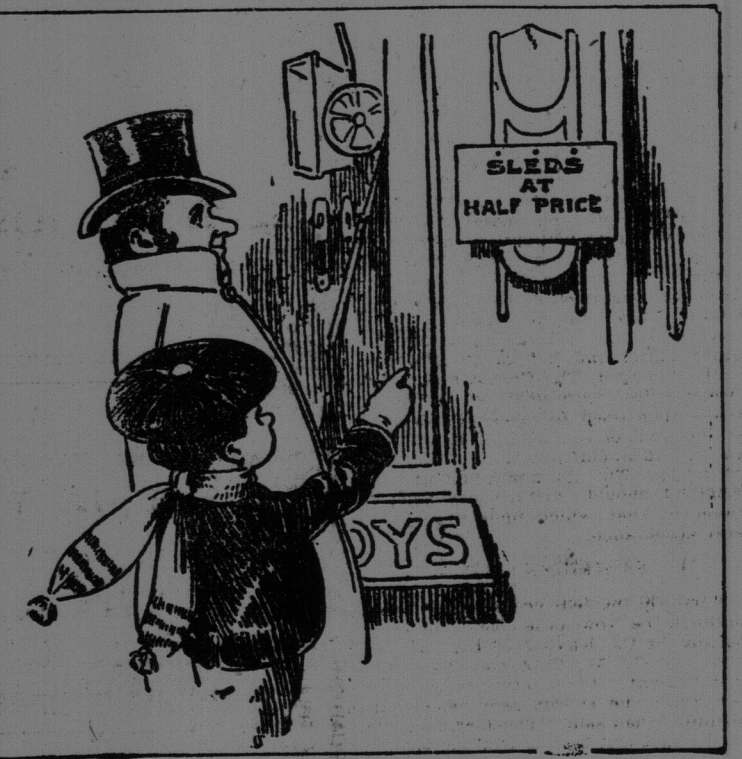

He also says that he and one of the other prisoners made an attempt to blow up the Riverside roundhouse of the railroad company some time ago. He received 50 cents for this work also.

## SIMMS' MEMORIAL CHURCH NOW ABOUT COMPLETED

Baptist Foreign Mission Board in Session—See Higgins ill—Mission Station in India May be Purchased.

The Baptist Foreign Mission Board held its regular monthly meeting in the mission rooms, Prince William street, yesterday afternoon. W. H. Higgins occupied the chair, and reported from India that the Simms' memorial church was about completed. A letter from Secretary W. V. Higgins stated that owing to illness he had been compelled to go to the Baptist hospital at Roxbury (Mass.) for advice and treatment. Much sympathy was expressed for Mr. Higgins.

A communication received from Dr. Thompson, secretary of the London Missionary Society, London, England, stated that he had decided to withdraw from Visapattana, a district lying between the north of the two Canadian Baptist Missionary Societies in India, and offering the purchase of the station to the local board. The property includes some valuable buildings, including a school with 700 pupils. It is valued at about \$12,000. A committee of seven, consisting of W. H. Higgins (chairman), A. A. Wilson, K. C., E. M. Squire, Rev. J. S. Archibald, Rev. Dr. W. R. McIntyre, Rev. D. Hutchinson, Rev. W. V. Higgins, was appointed to consider the acquisition of this important link with the station to the local board. The committee was authorized to meet with a committee of nine appointed by the Ontario Baptist Mission Board, to consider the union of the two boards, thus bringing the Foreign Mission Board into line with the churches of Canada under one management. The committee will probably meet in St. John in February.

A letter was received from Rev. J. B. Harkness, secretary of the Western Canadian Baptist Mission Board, announcing that the Western Baptists had made an appropriation of \$100 for the work of the Maritime or local board. This is a new departure on the part of the Western Baptists, and is greatly appreciated. A letter from India announced that Mrs. G. Churchill, who has been a devoted missionary, was prepared to give \$100 towards the building of a bungalow at that station. The committee was thanked for the report.

The committee on travelling allowances reported a favor of continuing the present arrangement of allowing \$325 for each missionary for the trip to India with the understanding that any portion of the amount not used will be refunded to the board.
