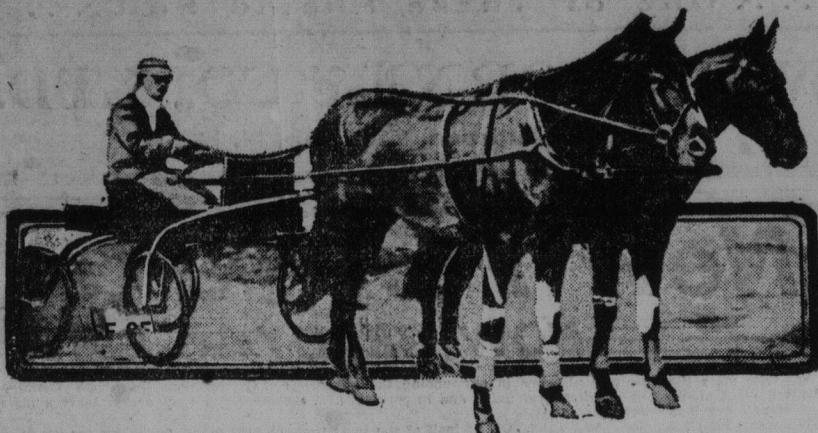

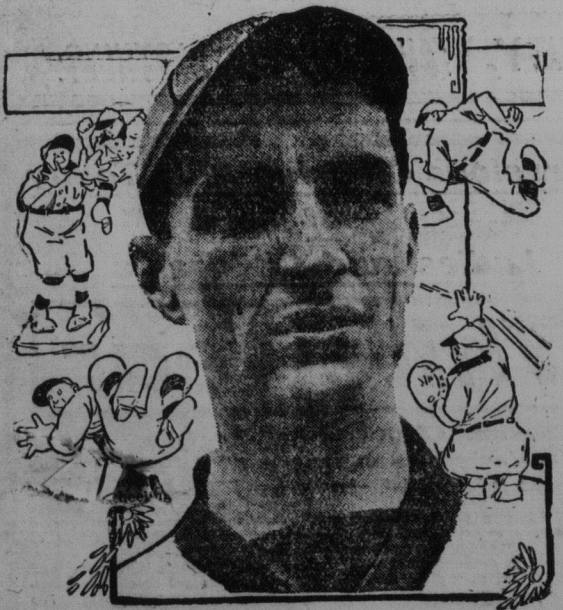

JIMMY ARCHER'S 'SQUAT THROW'
SENSATION IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

Jimmy Archer.

Chicago, Aug. 26.—No one will deny that Hugh Jennings, the Detroit leader, and Fred Clarke, of Pittsburgh, are great managers, but—

Hugh and Fred made one big mistake each when they let Jimmy Archer get away, and Frank Chance, the Cub manager, showed one of the traits which stamp him as a baseball general when he grabbed Archer to take the place of the rebellious Johnny Kling. Jennings couldn't see Archer with binoculars. Neither could Clarke, who saw him work and added him to his stable. And Archer has been making history in the National League ever since.

As a thrower to the bases there isn't a man in the big leagues who compares with Archer. He is in a class by himself, whipping the ball down so fast that he gets a runner who is careless enough to so much as lose his balance.

Archer is parent of the "squat throw." He hasn't patented the toss

yet, but he's the only one using it because the others can't acquire the knack.

The "squat throw" is made while Archer is sitting on his heels in the position all backstops assume when signalling the pitcher. In this position it is impossible for the runner to tell when he is going to make the throw, and Archer does it with so little effort that runners stick closer than poor relatives when he is doing the receiving.

Archer's throwing has won two world's records for him. Both were gained at the expense of Charlie Babb's Memphis club in the southern association when Archer was with Atlanta.

The first was the catching of three men off base in one inning on four pitched balls, and the other was catching seven men off first in one game.

Otto Williams, of the Pelicans, once

wagered \$50 he would steal at least

one base a game on Archer.

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8,000 PEOPLE SEE GREAT
RACING AT MAPLEWOOD PARK

2.20 Pace Goes Over Until Today After Four Heats Had been Fought Out Yesterday Without a Winner--Collision in 2.26 Trot Smashes Sulkies and Throws Drivers to Ground.

Bangor, Aug. 26.—Two events were concluded and one left unfinished after four fighting heats on the Maplewood track today. Eight thousand people saw the races, and the 2.20 pace kept them at a high pitch of excitement. Thirteen horses started in this event, and at dark none of them had succeeded in getting more than one heat, the four paced being divided between Ouida, H. A. D. Alberta G., and Nancy S. Ouida slipped and fell shortly after passing under the wire a winner in the first heat and after that was unable to do anything. Rain fell for half an hour early in the afternoon, making the track slow and slippery.

In the 2.26 trot Attorney at Law and Miss Fannie Delmar collided on the back stretch, smashing both sulkies and throwing the drivers. Wilkes Sherwood won on his merits. The green horse race was a procession.

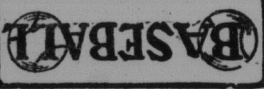
