BOARD OF TRADE MEMBERS DISCUSS MAIL CONTRACTS AND MORE PROTECTION IN BAY

Council Asked to Take Action to Secure Renewal of Contracts for Mail-Carrying Steamers to This Port—Lighthouse on Old Proprietor Urged—The Reciprocity Move.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon was enlivened by the introduction of several questions of importance to the city. L. P. D. Tilley introduced the matter of the expiry of the contract between the government and the C. P. R. in reference to the carriage of mails and urged that the board should take action as far as possible to secure the Empire steamers for this port. W. Frank Hatheway, M.P.P., re-introduced the matter of a stationary light on the Old Proprietor Ledge at the mouth of the Bay and pointed out that the council of the board should again urge the necessity of the providing of such a light upon the Dominion government. He also referred to the possibility of a reciprocal treaty between the United States and Canada being brought up in the near future and thought that the tariff committee of the board should meet and decide what changes would be most in the interests of the eastern provinces of Canada.

T. H. Eastbrooks presided. The attendance of members was not large.

Council Summary.

The summary of the proceedings of the council was read as follows and adopted:—

The Telephone Committee has held several meetings. The following gentlemen, Messrs. W. H. Thorne, W. F. Hatheway and H. B. Schofield with R. G. Murray have retained H. A. Powell, K.C., to represent them in laying a complaint against the N. B. Telephone Co. before the Public Utilities Commission. The commission was notified at its last sitting that these gentlemen would ask for an investigation of the company's business.

E. L. Rising who was appointed a member of the special committee of the board has found it impossible to serve and H. B. Schofield was appointed by the committee in his place.

West Indies Business.

According to press despatches of the report of the Royal West Indies Commission, their report recommends direct steamship sailings from Halifax and from Montreal and St. John.

It would appear from this that no provision had been made for a summer service out of St. John. The matter, has however, been taken up with Ottawa, and if it is found necessary representation will be made to the St. John provided with an all-the-year-round service.

Advertising Committee.

The "Made-in-St. John" exhibit carried out by the advertising committee of the board at the Dominion Exhibition was one of the best advertised. St. John has even had the variety and quality of the goods displayed were as much of a surprise to many St. John people as to the strangers who visited the booth. Most complimentary remarks were heard from everyone who saw it.

The efforts of the committee were very much handicapped in not having more space at their disposal. The space allotted to them was one hundred feet front by ten feet deep. This did not give much chance to show the products of the hundred or more manufacturing establishments of the city, but a complete display from one or two of which would have occupied the entire space. The best committee could do was to take a sample from each of the establishments, but even this made a very creditable showing.

The opportunity was taken to distribute some five or six thousand booklets descriptively of the manufacturing interests of St. John to visitors who made inquiries at the booth, or expressed an interest in the future of the city.

The securing of the extra lighting of the city streets during the exhibition was the work of the advertising committee and added very much to the attractiveness of the city during exhibition period.

The committee is continuing its special correspondence with some hundred and fifty newspapers throughout the United States and Western Canada, sending weekly reports of industrial growth and development taking place throughout New Brunswick. Connections are being established now with publications in Great Britain that will handle our news matter and especially prepared articles dealing with opportunities in this province.

Inquiries From Abroad.

The weekly trade bulletin sent out by the department of trade and commerce, Ottawa, contains inquiries from merchants and manufacturers in Great Britain and foreign countries regarding the possibility of trade with Canadian houses.

President Eastbrooks referred to the coming visit to this city of Charles M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, and said that the council of the Board of Trade would tender him a banquet.

An invitation was received from the Free Kindergarten committee asking that the board should be represented at the annual meeting. President Eastbrooks took occasion to refer to the importance of the kindergarten work and hoped many members as possible would attend.

The Mail Service.

L. P. D. Tilley asked if the president knew when the contract between the Government and the C. P. R. in reference to the carriage of mails expired. Mr. Eastbrooks replied that it would expire in May, 1912.

Mr. Tilley said there had been reports in the papers that the Empire steamers might cut this port out of the calling list, and if there was any change in the reports he would like to get busy and see what could be done. It should be attended to at once. If the steamers intended to call at only one port, and that not at St. John, then the people should get together, irrespective of politics, and work for the interests of this port. If the Empire steamers should not call at St. John direct, the citizens should act in time and conclude the arrangement. The steamers leave a great deal of time here, and the call at this port is a large advertisement for St. John, and consequently some action should be taken at once. He moved that the question of the renewal of the mail carrying contract with all the steamers should be referred to the council of the board to act upon.

S. W. MacLachlan seconded the motion which was carried.

Dr. J. W. Daniel, M. P., said it had been suggested that after the contract with the C. P. R. expired the Canadian Northern steamers Royal Edward and Royal George would be factors in any arrangement which might be made, and that payment for the mails might be by weight, the work to go to the fastest steamers. In this case it would be well to consider that there was any action which the board would take. The motion was an opportune one and would give the board time to find out what would be done.

President Eastbrooks said the council and the advertising committee appreciated the support which they had received from the board in their advertising campaign. A limited amount of work had been done, and the results had been good. There was a more optimistic feeling abroad in reference to this city, and he believed it had been communicated in no small degree to the local business men.

Outlook for Reciprocity.

W. Frank Hatheway, M. P., said there was a way of better protection throughout Canada in favor of a reciprocal treaty with the United States. President Taft when seen on the matter, said he felt that his country should have a closer trade relations with Canada and Sir Wilfrid Laurier had also pledged himself in his favor. There was an idea abroad that this year an envoy would be sent to negotiate for a reciprocity treaty. When the last tariff was framed the tariff committee of the board had considered what changes should be made in the interest of the eastern provinces and similar action should be taken this year.

Probably there would be a demand from the east for a better arrangement in fish, lumber and possibly agricultural products. Eastern Canada might well ask for a reduction on the duty in American flour. The prices of the highest grades of United States flour were \$5.70 per bbl. by the car load while the highest grades of Canadian flour at present cost \$5.00 per bbl. on American flour he believed, to be 60 cents per bbl. and with free trade in this item there would be a benefit to the east. SEWERAGE FOR LANCASTER

Municipal Council Authorizes Issuance of \$50,000 Bonds — Alms House Accounts Squared—Water for Hospital

The Municipal Council at its quarterly meeting yesterday afternoon decided to issue bonds to install a sewerage system in Lancaster, and provide a better water service for the General Public Hospital. Overdrafts of between \$6,000 and \$7,000 on account of the Municipal Home were ordered paid off and other business transacted.

Besides Warden Connolly there were present Councillors McGoldrick, Potts, Willet, Holder, Sprout, Russell, Baxter, Smith, White, Frink, Elkin, Hayes of the city, Fox, Curran, and Barnhill, of Lancaster; Donovan, Adams and Stewart of Simonds; Cochrane and Black of St. Martins; Corscadden and Dean of Musquash.

The minutes of the last meeting were confirmed. Councillor Baxter submitted the report of the finance committee, recommending the payment of a number of bills, the appointment of Councillor Frink and the County Secretary as a committee to confer with the sheriff in reference to the provision of supplies for the jail, and to authorize the county secretary to pay the parish revisors and assessors upon the completion of their work, and instructing him to take measures to collect the local taxes. The report was adopted without debate.

Coun. Baxter called attention to the fact that there was a balance of over \$6,000 which ought to be paid to the Municipal Home. He said the great difficulty was that the home had usually an overdrawn account at the banks. He advised his successor to see that the commissioners did not exceed their estimates in future. The present overdraft represented the over-expenditures of many years.

Councillor Baxter's Farewell.

Continuing Councillor Baxter referred to the fact that he was retiring from active participation in the administration of the affairs of the county and expressed his regret at the severing of his connection with the county council. Since entering that body, he said, he had noticed a growing friendliness between the

parish and city councillors—a disposition to co-operate in an effort to promote mutual interests such as had not been in evidence some decades ago. His association with the county council had been pleasurable to him. Ald. Potts moved that the accounts of the Municipal Home be squared up and overdrafts prohibited in the future.

Councillor Donovan wanted to know where the money was to come from? Councillor Baxter said the treasurer had about \$7,000 on hand. The county was receiving about 3 per cent. interest on this, while the Municipal Home was paying 6 per cent. on an overdraft for about the same amount.

The auditor said the Home had been paid its proportion of the annual grant up to date.

Coun. Baxter wanted to know who was responsible for the extra expenditure.

Secretary Kelley said the commissioners of the Home were personally liable.

After some further discussion Ald. Potts' motion to square the account was adopted.

On motion of Coun. Donovan, it was decided to ask the commissioners of the Municipal Home to appear before the finance committee at its December meeting to give an account of its expenditures.

Coun. Cochrane then made a brief speech, expressing his personal regret at the retirement of Coun. Baxter. He said Coun. Baxter had always tried to give the parish a fair and square treatment. He felt the city would have a competent official in his new recorder.

CLOSING COTTON LETTER.

New York Oct. 4.—The sentiment as the effect of yesterday's crop report was evidently more widespread this morning than the reactionists anticipated and heavy profit taking sales during the morning were eagerly awaited by new buyers. While the government figures were in line with expectations and according to the calculations of the trading element had been largely discounted the new buying that was stimulated from all parts of the South was not reckoned with. According to general report the heavy buying of the early wire months by big spot interests was done from motive of protection against the possibility of another wave of bull speculation. While the mathematical crop, based on yesterday's census figures, was in the neighborhood of twelve million bales, it must be remembered that there remains the possibility of further

their curtailment by frost or weevil and that the mills are entering the new crop year practically bare of stocks. While it is possible and even likely that the current wave of bullish enthusiasm may result in an overbought market, from time to time, and consequent sharp reactions, it is hard to foresee any permanent decline from the present level.
