NORTH SHORE TO THE FRONT

Newcastle, Nov. 10.—The following was telegraphed to Ottawa last night: Newcastle, Nov. 10, 1915.
 "To the Honorable Sir Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, Ottawa:
 "The citizens of Newcastle and of the upper section of Northumberland county held a representative meeting here on 9th instant to consider the proposal of raising a battalion under Lieutenant-Colonel Mersereau for overseas service and to be recruited from the four northern counties of New Brunswick.
 "The meeting was representative and enthusiastic and in full accord with the proposal. It was also of the opinion that this battalion could easily be recruited within the bounds of these counties and it unanimously passed a resolution that if Lieut.-Col. Mersereau's offer to raise this battalion was accepted the citizens would do all in their power to make the project a success.
 "Resolutions were also adopted approving the proposal of the Minister of Militia that recruited men when in sufficient numbers be quartered and drilled in towns in their vicinity during the winter.
 "A committee was appointed to respectfully urge upon you the desirability of accepting Lieut.-Col. Mersereau's offer and of communicating to you the resolutions adopted by the meeting.
 "(Sgd) G. G. Stohart, Mayor and chairman of committee."

THE SUPREME COURT OF APPEAL

Fredericton, Nov. 11.—In the case of Dalhousie Lumber Company vs. Walker, and the King vs. William Wilson, Judge of the York County Court, *ex parte*, Bowman Crookshank et al., argued on Wednesday, court considered.
 The St. John Lumber Company's appeal from the judgment of Judge Barry in a recent suit for wages, which involved a sum of \$48, was up for argument today; Mr. J. J. F. Winslow supporting appeal, and Messrs. Carvell, K. C., and F. L. Hayward contra. Appellant's counsel contended that action should have been laid in a State of Maine court, where the contract was performed. Five other cases pending will hinge upon the decision. The court considers.

Argument in the case of the Amherst Piano Limited, vs. Minnie Adney was completed this afternoon. W. P. Jones, K. C., appeared for the company and Mrs. Adney argued her own case, moving to set aside a verdict for the plaintiff and to enter a verdict for the defendant, or for a new trial. Court considers.

 Charles H. Baker, B. A., LL. B., of Fairville, graduate from Acadia 1912, and took his law degree at Harvard 1915. Is taking lieutenant course at Halifax, and was lately attached to N. B. Dragons.
 Louis P. A. Robichaud, B. A., LL. B., of St. John's, graduate of St. Joseph's College and Dalhousie Law School. Will probably practice in his native county of Kent.
 George H. I. Cockburn, B. A., LL. B., son of M. J. Cockburn of St. Andrews, judge of probate, graduated at U. N. B. 1912, and later at Dalhousie Law School. He will be associated with his father, the new firm's offices being in St. Andrews and St. Stephen, N. B.
 Robert L. Sims, B. A., LL. B., of the U. N. B., class of 1914, is now residence in South Knowlerville, Carleton county.

BASEBALL BEHIND THE TRENCHES

Although the Canadian boys in France are doing their best to defeat the Hun, they still have time to indulge in sports.
 On Oct. 16th, "somewhere in France" two Canadian nines played a baseball game under unusual circumstances. With big guns booming in the distance and aeroplanes buzzing overhead, the umpire announced the batter to the men who had just been relieved of trench duty and were finding rest in playing and watching a game of ball.
 The teams were made up of men chosen from the Mechanical Transport and Strathcona Horse, Charlie Gage, the Toronto Varsity football captain of last year and one of the best amateur ball tossers around Toronto, caught for the Transport men. Among other athletes of note were "Shorty" Lewis, the crack little quarterback of Ottawa I's and "Red" Bill Burkholder, the big scrimmage of the Hamilton Tigers of 1908. Both played for the Transport team.
 Along in the seventh inning with the score a tie at 1-1, the shells commenced dropping in the outfield, so the umpire called the contest "on account of rain."
 In a Canadian football game the Mechanical Transport beat Strathcona Horse 5 to 3.

AMERICAN INVASION OF JAPAN

Unusual success has greeted the University of Chicago baseball team in Japan, where the athletes are giving exhibitions before large crowds.
 The first game in the international series was played on Sept. 24 in Tokyo. A crowd of 20,000 persons saw the Chicagoans defeat the Waseda University representatives, 5 to 3. The Chicago players won their second game, which was with the University of Keio, by 4 to 1. The team is accompanied on its trip by Coach Harlan O. Page, class of 1910, and Professor Chester Whitney Wright of the Department of Political Economy, representative of the university faculty.

WILL MEAN BIG SAVING TO THE DOMINION

 Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 11.—By issuing the coming domestic loan direct to the public rather than through financial agents Hon. W. T. White, Minister of Finance, will save the Dominion some \$875,000. This is reckoning that the same commission would be paid here as was paid by the Anglo-French commission recently to the American financial agents who underwrote their \$500,000,000 loan. They underwrote it at 95 and sold to the public at 98, but they had expenses amounting to about one-quarter of one per cent. This left the 1 1/4 per cent. clear commission.
 Hon. Mr. White's plan will obviate the necessity of paying any such commission. He will have some expenses, including the advertising of the loan, but they will be comparatively small in amount. Present indications are that the loan will be quickly taken up by both financial institutions and private investors.

PROTEST FROM SWISS GOVERNMENT.

Berne, via Paris, Nov. 11.—The Swiss government is making representations in certain belligerent countries against interference by censorship with mail from Switzerland to neutral countries, and particularly to the United States. The Swiss National Bank is alleged to have had mail addressed to its New York correspondent containing checks and coupons, seized in transit, in violation of this government holds of the international postal treaty.
