MOBILIZATION. London, May 23.—(6 p.m.).—A Rome despatch to the Stafani Bureau dated Saturday says that the general mobilization of the army and navy, ordered by Royal decree, will begin Sunday. All vehicles and draught animals will be requisitioned. Ordinary passenger and freight service on the railways will not be disturbed. Rome, via Paris, May 23.—General mobilization will begin Sunday. The ministers of war and marine have proclaimed a state of war in the italian provinces bordering on Austria, in the islands and cities ajong the Adriatic coast, as well as all the fortresses, which will be declared in a state of defence.
