

CUSTOMS DEPT. GETS CONSCIENCE MONEY

Montreal Contribution, Yesterday, Amounted to \$180—
An \$800 Package Received
at Ottawa Some Time Ago.

Ottawa, Jan. 29.—The customs department received today \$180 conscience money from Montreal.
While occasionally small sums, ranging in the vicinity of one or two dollars are received, the present contribution from Montreal is the largest received for some time.
Some time ago a remarkable parcel was received in the department. It was wrapped in brown paper, tied loosely with string and bore the Ottawa postmark. Examination revealed it to be fifty dollar bills, a total of \$800. This money was evidently brought to Ottawa and sent in to the department in this way. As, of course, senders of these amounts never volunteer their names, the department acknowledges through the medium of the press the receipt thereof.

SAYS WORKING MEN SHOULD PATTERN BY THE BOARD OF TRADE

Vice-President of Plumber's
International Union Urges
Workers to Get Together
—Mass Meeting in Longshoremen's Hall.

The address of Mr. Bruce, international vice president of the Plumber's union, delivered before a large meeting of workers held in the Longshoremen's hall last evening, contained some statements which sounded not unlike the message delivered by Mr. Chase before the meeting of business men on Tuesday evening. Mr. Bruce said the secret of success for the workingmen was to get together and study their class interest, and work together for the advancement of the welfare of the workers as a whole.

It was good business for the business men to invest money in the Board of Trade it was better business for the workers to invest money in their trade organizations. Many trade unions had paid their members several thousands per cent. in the way of increased wages, and better working conditions.
The speaker painted a gloomy picture of the condition of the women workers in modern industry, and said the local Women's Council of Toronto was moving to secure a law fixing a minimum wage of \$9.00 a week for women workers.
He urged closer co-operation between the unions, saying that the labor problem could only be solved on a class basis and by use of the political power.

After the address there was a discussion, and a resolution was unanimously adopted protesting against the abolition of the \$5.00 tax on people coming here to work, on the ground that there was plenty of competition for jobs now, and that the people who came here did not spend much money with local merchants, etc., and hence did not help the business man as much as the native.

INSPECTOR WILL SEIZE UNLICENSED FILMS

Factory Inspector Gets Orders
to Confiscate all Moving
Picture Films Purchased
from Unlicensed Exchanges

In view of the fact that some of the moving picture houses of the province have been bringing in films from Montreal instead of dealing with the local film exchanges which pay a license of \$200, the factory inspector has received orders to seize all the films of the Crystal Palace Film Company, of Montreal, which may be found in the province.
The factory inspector has returned from a trip to the northern parts of the province where he has been making an inspection of moving picture houses. He reports that the picture house of Mr. Dimock at Campbellton and that of The Victoria Specialty Company at Andover are fitted up as well as any in St. John, but that in some of the smaller towns the picture house will have to be greatly improved to make them conform with the law. There are about 35 moving picture houses in the province.
