THE VORWAERTS REPORTS DOINGS OF INNER CIRCLE

Publishes a Series of Tele-
grams Alleged to Have
Been Sent in Early Stages
of the War.

Berlin, Nov. 29.—A series of tele-
grams alleged to have been sent in the
early stages of the war by the then
German Crown Prince, to the Em-
peror, the Imperial Chancellor, Dr.
von Bethmann-Hollweg, Count Ernst
von Reventlow, editorial writer of the
Tages-Zeitung, and others, containing
criticisms of men and events, is pub-
lished by the Vorwarts.

In February, 1915, the Crown Prince
is said by the newspaper to have wired
to the Chancellor, expressing dis-
approval of an editorial in the North
German Gazette, discussing the war
aims. He also expressed disgust with
Professor Hans Delbrueck, of the Uni-
versity of Berlin, and others whom
he designated as "redne idiots." Del-
brueck especially appeared to have
grieved sorely the patience of the Em-
peror, who, under date of Decem-
ber 20, 1914, wired his father as fol-
lows:

"Professor Delbrueck, of Berlin, has
written an unheard of article in the
Prussian year book in which he dis-
plays the most vulgar and most un-
patriotic sentiments. I urgently beg
you to remove this fellow from the
university. If he has influential
friends in higher civilian positions,
this circumstance does not alter the
case."

The Vorwarts expresses the be-
lief that Delbrueck, whom the paper
describes as "Bethmann's intellectual
paladin, a man who was pious in his
devotion to the Hohenzollerns," will
be surprised and amused when he
learns of the proposed Christmas gift
the Crown Prince had in store for him
five years ago.

In a message to Reventlow the
Crown Prince complimented the Pan-
German editor for his rebuke to Ed-
itor Zimmermann, of the Lokal Anzei-
ger, who, early in 1915, ventured to
discuss war aims. That same day
the Hohenzollern action telegraphed to
August Scherl, owner of the Lokal An-
zeiger, thus:

"I regret exceedingly that your ed-
itor, Zimmermann, has been allowed
to write such nonsense. All of us
recognize only one war aim: 'down
with England.'"

The Vorwarts states that the
Crown Prince apparently inherited
from his sire not only the "gift of
gab" but also a fondness for tel-
egraphing. The paper concludes:

"With such pleasanties this army
leader and danger after petticoats
tarnished himself before the enemy."

the board on the Hostel Committee.
