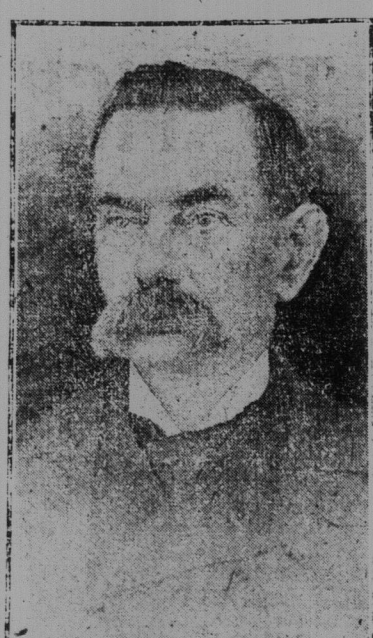
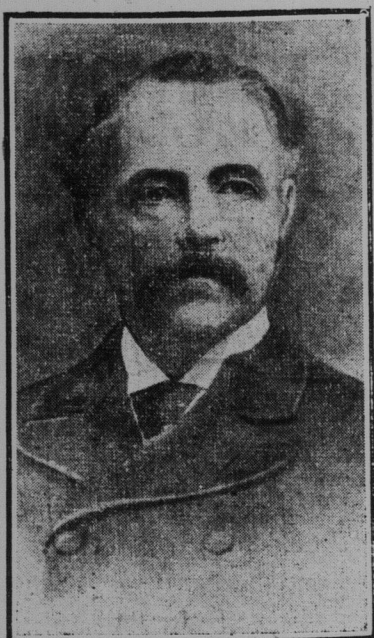

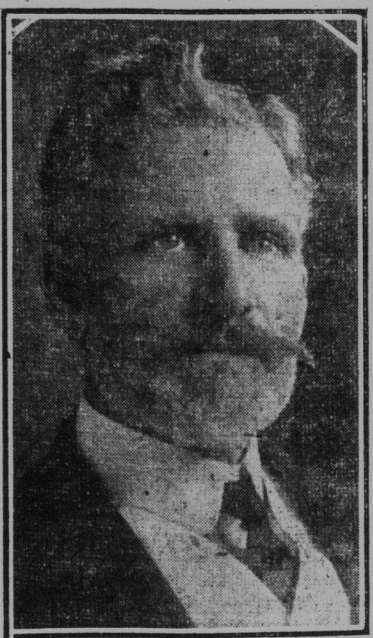

Liberal Candidate in Gloucester County.



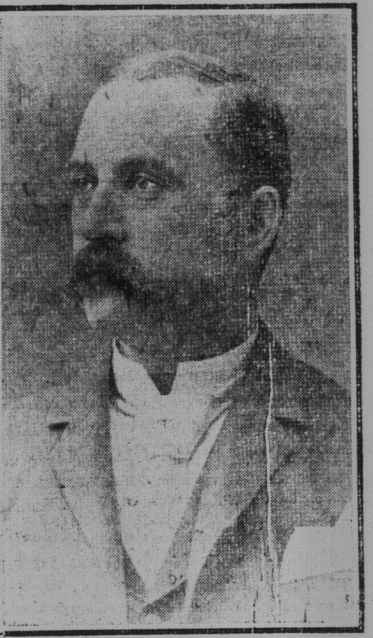
HON. JOHN COSTIGAN,

## THOUSANDS AT BORDEN'S MEETING

(Continued from page 1.)  
by quoting Mr. Blair and showing that there were no safe guards in the contract to prevent western freight of the G. T. P. going via Portland instead of Canadian ports.  
Mr. Borden, amid cheers, advocated the country building the road and ensuring to Canadian ports the traffic from the west. The cost of the road to the country under the present proposal would be \$150,000,000 or nine-tenths of the entire cost. He advocated the country assuming ten-tenths and owning the road.

### Meant Crippling of I. C. R.

He proceeded to show that the construction and operation of the eastern section of the G. T. P. meant the crippling of the Intercolonial. Did Moncton want a greater Intercolonial? (Cheers.) Then the way to make a great Intercolonial and secure through freight for the maritime ports was for the government construction and ownership of the transcontinental. (Prolonged cheers.) Would it not be to the interests of the maritime provinces to extend our government railway? he asked. Laurier pronounced the system vicious, which meant that his policy, if sustained, would be the disposal of the Intercolonial. Liberal campaigners in Ontario called the I. C. R. a sink hole. The people had 1,500 miles railway in Canada. Were they going to give it away to corporations already too powerful in this country? (Cheers and cries of no, no!) Were we going to let it stand still while companies develop their railways?  
As Mr. Blair said, there was just one

way to make the Intercolonial a profitable enterprise for Canada, and that was by extending the line. The government did not believe in the extension of the Intercolonial, nor in the operation of a government railway, yet they extended the I. C. R. to Montreal and recently acquired the Canada Eastern.

The Conservative leader's policy on the railway question was received with enthusiasm and marked favor by the audience. In conclusion, he said that signs from all provinces indicated the return of the Conservatives to power, and he believed Westmorland would undo the wrong side did four years ago, and this time elect H. A. Powell. Mr. Borden was enthusiastically cheered as he sat down.

A pleasing incident at the close of the speech was the presentation of a bouquet to Mr. Borden by Master Willett, son of G. B. Willett, who was decorated in Scotch plaids.

Mr. Borden, after the speech in the rink, hastened to the Opera House, where Mr. Powell had been speaking for more than an hour to a densely packed house. The Conservative leader spoke about an hour in the Opera House, where F. W. Sumner presided.

O. M. Melanson was called upon at the rink, and spoke briefly in French, being given a hearty reception. Mr. Powell followed in an hour speech, being given an equally cordial reception as his leader. Mr. Powell spoke on the Conservative fiscal policy, railway question and touched on broken pledges of the government. Dealing with the railway question he showed that the Conservative policy of protection and ownership of railways meant that the money now being sent to United States concerns would remain in Canada for the benefit of Canadian industries and Canadian workmen.

The Conservative candidate was given a splendid hearing and cheered throughout his speech.

At the close of the speech cheers were given for the King, Borden and Powell.

At a reception held in the rink on Mr. Borden's return from the Opera House, hundreds were presented to the Conservative leader.

The Conservatives of Moncton are greatly enthused over the demonstration, which is taken to mean that the people are thoroughly aroused over the railway question.

The appearance of Mr. Blair here is largely looked forward to, and is the talk of the hour.
