## Splendid Recital At Kingston

The weather man was most kind to Mr. Hurlley on the night of his recital at Kingston on November 12th, it being a beautiful warm, moon-light night, the rain only coming down after every one had returned home. There was a good audience to greet him, when, after a selection by the Kingston orchestra, he appeared on the platform.

Miss Nelson accompanied him thru his first group of songs, and divided the groups by piano solos, beautifully rendered, despite the fact that she had but recently come through a serious illness.

Miss Hurlley, who was with her brother last winter in Toronto, played the accompaniments of groups 2 and 3. The sympathy between singer and piano was very marked, and it was easy to realize they had worked much together.

It would be difficult to say which of Mr. Hurlley's selections was the favorite. The program was selected to suit the tastes of all and apparently succeeded in doing so. Exquisitely rendered was his encore song to the first group, "Sylvia," being given with a daintiness and grace that was very pleasing, while the little Irish lyric, "Nora," sung after the second group was given, with a whimsicality and abandon to the spirit of the song that made it a favorite.

Mr. Hurlley has a voice of unusual power, sweetness and range and the quality is very even. His flexibility as shown in his renderings of "I Hear You Calling Me," and "Dana," was unusually pronounced. Very quaint was the 15th Century song in the second group, a favorite of Caruso's, "Love Me or Not."

The Kingston Orchestra, under the faithful leadership of Mr. Hilton has not been long in existence, but there was nothing in their performances on Wednesday night to proclaim the fact it is to be hoped they will continue good work. They closed the concert with the National Anthem; a concert enjoyed by all, and that must have been gratifying to Mr. Hurlley and his friends, including Rev. A. McLeod, Mrs. McLeod, and the Trustees of the church, who so kindly did all in their power to make it a success. Mr. Hurlley, with Miss Hurlley and Miss Nelson, received his friends and theirs at the close.

## Former Middletonian Dies In The West

Word was received by relatives here at Middleton recently, of the death on Wednesday of last week at Victoria, B.C., of Frank A. Andrews, as the result of an accident. Mr. Andrews was a native of Nova Scotia, and spent the greater part of his life here in Middleton. He received his early education in this province, too a B.A. degree at Acadia, and then spent several years teaching here. He always took a keen interest in politics, being an ardent Conservative, and represented this country in the Local Legislature from 1886 until 1890. For several years he held the office of postmaster in Middleton. For the past eighteen years the late Mr. Andrews had been instructor in mathematics on the staff of the Victoria, B.C. High School.

He leaves a wife, residing in Victoria, one brother, Dr. G. R. Andrews, of Malden, Mass., and two brothers, Arthur and George, residing in Middleton.

Interment was made at Glenwood, Mass.
