Linwood Assault Charge

A charge of assault against Mr. Herman Wismer of Linwood preferred by Mr. Joseph Stueber also of that town was heard in Police Court this morning. After hearing the evidence of the complainant, and Mr. Addison Grasser and Mr. Henry Stueber, the case was adjourned until the June sessions, the defendant furnishing bail for \$500.

Mayor Winter of Windsor, has announced that the Hudson Automobile Corporation and Dodge Bros. of Detroit, are negotiating for factory sites in Windsor. The Chamber of Commerce, the Mayor said, is dealing with the officials of the Detroit companies.

The industrial boom, which Windsor and neighboring municipalities are experiencing, was given further impetus by the announcement from the officials of General Motors that 12,000 feet of floor space for a temporary factory. The company proposes to employ 200 persons at the start.

Stratford Barbers Hours

Stratford master barbers turned out in full force to meet a committee of the journeymen barbers for the purpose of reaching an agreement over the length of working hours. It was decided to close the shops at 7:30 every night, except Saturday night and a night before a holiday, when the shops will be kept open till 10.

The men will be granted a half holiday on Wednesdays, commencing May 14 and ending September 17. There will be no half holiday on Wednesday when there is a holiday during the week.

Officers for the coming year were elected at the first meeting of the Board of Directors of the Stratford Chamber of Commerce, and important committees were appointed to start the work of the new chamber. J. R. Macdonald was elected President, C. A. Mayberry First Vice-President; W. J. Kemp, Second Vice-President; the Directors took advantage of the clause in the bylaws that provided that the Treasurer may be elected off the Board and elected R. J. Moffatt as Treasurer.
