

- June 21 forego any remuneration by the Foundation for any time he might devote  
(cont'd.) to politics. Mr. King also mentioned it would not be possible to enter  
on work of Foundation till October 1st, owing to promise to be on a  
political tour with Sir Wilfrid Laurier during August and September.
- June 23 Letter, Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Jr. to King, expressing satisfaction at  
agreement reached on Sunday that K. would undertake the study of  
industrial relations on behalf of the Rockefeller Foundation.
- The scope of this study and the program to be followed are matters  
to be considered and agreed upon. It is our desire the scope should  
be as broad, and as comprehensive as possible, for only as a result  
of such an intensive investigation can we hope to be in a position  
to make helpful suggestions looking toward improvement in industrial  
relations.
- Substance of important features of Sunday's conversation recorded.
- The letter elsewhere speaks of "your decision to co-operate with us  
in the study of this world problem of industrial relationships".
- July 2 Conference, Mr. Greene, Mr. Murphy, and Mr. King, at New York.
- Letter, Murphy to King, recording particulars of agreement between King  
and Foundation.
- July 6 Letter, King to Murphy, expressing entire accord with understanding as  
set forth in Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Jr.'s letter of June 23rd and his  
of July 2nd.
- Letters of acknowledgment to Messrs. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Murphy,  
and Greene, from King - personal rather than official.
