### LEGISLATURE IN SESSION.

Tributes to the Dead-Municipal Power Plants-Assessment Law

Toronto, April 22.—The Legislature resumed yesterday afternoon and transacted a volume of business which would do credit to an ordinary period of a week. The death of the Lieutenant-Governor was the of the Lieutenant-Governor was the subject of eloquent and appropriate references by Premier Ross and Mr. Whitney. The former spoke with evident feeling and moving sincerity of one with whom he had been so long associated as leader and as Governor. Mr. Whitney fully concurred, and praised Sir Oliver Mowat as a strong party man. The Premier introduced the bill giving municipalities authority to engage in the development, transmission and distribution of power. He also introduced the bill for the regulation of municipal taxation. This is tion of municipal taxation. This is the measure recommended by the Assessment Commission a year ago, and which is quite revolutionary in its character. It will doubtless be referred to a special committee at an early date. The consolidated municipal act, a large roll of proofs, which in appearance resembled a potyglot petition for the suppression of some popular vice, was introduced by the Attorney-General, while Mr. Harcourt introduced a bill to amend the public school act. The address in reply to the speech from the throne was formally passed, thus clearing the way for Mr. Stratton to lay on the table about thirty departmental reports. of municipal taxation

### FINANCES OF ONTARIO.

THE PUBLIC ACCOUNTS LAID ON THE TABLE.

Visible Surplus of \$1,418,693-Succession Duties - Expenditures on Wolf Bounties, Monuments, Elections, Subsidies, etc.

Toronto, April 22.—The public accounts for Ontario for 1902, as presented to the House yesterday, show total receipts of \$4,291,082 and total expenditures of \$4,345,003. The baltotal expenditures of \$4,345,003. The balance from the public accounts of 1901 was \$175,561. The amount withdrawn from the special deposits was \$1,752,500, and the special deposits replaced was \$1,727,300, leaving a balance of \$187,779. The investment account shows \$1,227,31 in the banks and \$120,962 in interest-bearing securities, a total of \$1,148,683.
