AGAIN PROVED GREAT SUCCESS

Central School Thousand Present Repeat Concert to Another Crowded House

Several New and Novel Features Introduced—The Closing "Mizpah" Ochorus

The repeat concert of "The Central School Thousand" was almost as well attended as the initial performance. The plan was sold out early in the evening but it was not found necessary to sell standing room. In this respect alone the second presentation differed from the first in attendance.

The Central school teachers are all glad that the concert is over so that they can now have a rest. They worked hard and it was gratifying to see their arduous labors have such successful results.

Several interesting and delightful features were added at the second performance. One of the most pleasing of these was the trained pony game presented by the little tots from the Central school afternoon kindergarten. These children were under the direction of Miss Helen McTaggart, assisted by Miss Edith McCrae. Miss Rose Morrison presided at the piano. This number was a tribute to Miss Helen McTaggart, as an instructor of the little ones. The children were not practiced up for a public appearance, but one of the games they learned in the school room was selected and the little ones were given an opportunity to show their parents what they were learning at school. The little kindergartens did remarkably well and the large audience was delighted with their work.

The pupils of this morning kindergarten presented the same very entertaining games that they did on Friday morning, adding, however, to their repertoire. The bowing game was really too cute for anything and the manner in which the wee pupils of the kindergarten raced around the ring and then bowed to each other was very pleasing and interesting. Miss Green, the director, with the aid of Miss Dottie Lawrence, assistant, and Miss L. Walker, pianist, successfully directed the children in their movements. The little ones gave a very gratifying exhibition of what they have accomplished under the close instruction of Miss Green and her able assistants. Miss Green during her regime as director of the Central school kindergarten has made a name for herself as an instructor of the young. The results of her efforts have always been most successful. Miss Green is a model of neatness and taste herself and this fact was evidenced by the pupils themselves. When the little ones have a good example they are quick to follow it.

Little Viola Marshall's recitation of "My Sister" was charming. The little maiden's marvellous elocutionary ability and this is all the more remarkable in one so young. Viola Marshall's recitation last evening won the house and the Central School Thousand applauded as rapturously as did the large audience.

Miss Donalda Foreman, one of the pretty girl graduates, gave an exquisite piano solo. The young lady exhibited both clever execution, lightness of touch, and played with power and expression. Miss Foreman is a pupil of Miss Lillian Pratt.

One of the best choruses of the evening was the song "Mizpah." This was given by the Central School Thousand with Opera House fire effect and Chatham salute. The scenic effect was very unique and attractive.

Another very pleasing feature of the concert was the chorus "Sons of the British Empire" with solos by Miss Pearl Wanless and Master Putnam, the boy soprano. Both young people have voices of wonderful range, power and sweetness.

The teachers of this school will hold a meeting to-night to wind up affairs in connection with the concert and decide what they will do. The house was sold out again last night and enough money was taken in at the door to pay the Opera House expenses both nights. The receipts were over \$300 for both nights and about \$200 was cleared. This has been the most successful concert ever put on by the Central school. Mr. Elwes has put on several concerts during his successful regime here, but this was the success of successes.

UPTON WILL DIE.

Fanny McGarvey, the Prisoner, May be Examined at London.

London, Ont. Nov. 10.—At a late hour yesterday Patrick Upton, who was so frightfully injured by his niece, Fanny McGarvey, was still alive, though unconscious, and no hopes are entertained for his recovery. The mental condition of the prisoner remains the same. She did not rest much last night. She will come up for preliminary examination on Friday, and it is said by the jail officials that if her condition does not improve, the examination will be held at the court house here. If her condition warrants her removal, she will be taken to Strathroy for examination.

HE PREFERRED DEATH.

THE ITALIAN FINANCE MINISTER COMMITTED SUICIDE.

Was Apparently Afraid of Charges of Corruption Lodged Against Him by the Socialists.

Naples, Nov. 10.—Minister of Finance Rosano committed suicide by shooting during the night. He was found dead yesterday in his room, a revolver at his side.

Signor Rosano was given the position of Minister of Finance in the Italian Cabinet, the formation of which was announced only last Wednesday. Since the formation of the new Cabinet the Socialists had attacked Signor Rosano, charging him with corruption during his political career, challenging him to disprove the charges and adding that otherwise they would bring the matter up at the opening of the Chamber of Deputies.

A LAWYER'S LIABILITY.

Canadian Express Co. Paid Money to Wrong Party.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—Judge Morison yesterday reserved judgment in the interesting action of the Canadian Express Company against Frank W. McLean, barrister. In January last a money order on the company for \$393 was mailed to John W. Carter of the Sons of England. The order was presented at the company's office by a man representing himself as the payee. The company demanded his identification, and he sought the defendant's assistance. Mr. McLean suggested that, if he were the proper party, he should make a statutory declaration to that effect. Mr. McLean telephoned the company's manager, who consented to accept this identification. The declaration was made by the claimant and the money was paid over to Mr. McLean's stenographer, who took the document to the company's office. After deducting legal charges the balance was paid the claimant, who then disappeared. Mr. John W. Carter, the person properly entitled, later traced the payment to the company, and on making application for the money learned that it had been paid out. The company now sued Mr. McLean on the ground that he had guaranteed the man who received the money was the party entitled.

KEEP BRITISH CONNECTION.

Mr. Aylesworth at National Club Dinner.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—The annual King's birthday dinner of the National Club last evening was a most enjoyable social affair. Covers were laid for about ninety. The chair was occupied by Mr. Noel Marshall, the President, and the proceedings were of a purely domestic and informal character. The royal toast was honored by the singing of the national anthem and "God save our noble Emperor." The toast of "The Empire" was responded to by Mr. A. Aylesworth, K.C., and Col. Geo. T. Denison. Mr. Aylesworth spoke strongly of the advantages from the Canadian standpoint of British connection, and said there should be a scheme of Imperial unity. Col. Denison again advanced arguments for Canadian contributions toward Imperial defence. He said that while general taxation for that purpose could not be undertaken without representation, yet we might undertake the defence of our own shores without demanding Imperial representation. The toast of "Our Own Special Birthday" was happily responded to by Mr. J. F. Ellis and Mr. J. S. Willison, whose natal anniversaries also fell yesterday. The toast of "Ourselves" was responded to by Mr. Frank Arnold, Mr. J. F. Ellis and Mr. G. T. Irving, while Dr. Paton, a Canadian, now of Cologne, Germany, spoke in reply to an impromptu toast. The songs of Mr. Arthur Blight constituted one of the features of the evening.

WHY ELECTION STILL DELAYED?

Both Spirit and Letter of the Law Violated by Defaulters

Official Record of the North Renfrew Vacancy—Text of the Statutes

Chapter 12 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario is explicit in providing for the election of a member to the legislative assembly to fill the vacancy caused by the death of a member. J. W. Munro, who was elected for the riding of North Renfrew by a majority of nearly 500 on May 29, 1902, died on May 30, causing a vacancy in the constituency. The legislature met on March 10 of this year, and the constituency is still vacant. Here is what Sections 36 and 37 of the act say:

ACT COVERING VACANCIES.

Section 36.—(1) If a vacancy happens in the legislative assembly by the death of a member, or by his accepting any office, commission or employment, or by his becoming a party to a contract, as mentioned in Section 9 of this act, the Speaker, on being informed of the vacancy by a member of the said assembly in his place, or by notice in writing under the hands and seals of two members of the said assembly, shall forthwith address the warrant to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery for the issue of a new writ for the election of a member to fill the vacancy, AND A NEW WRIT SHALL ISSUE ACCORDINGLY.

Section 37.—(1) A warrant may issue under the hands and seals of two members elect of the legislative assembly to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, for the issue of a new writ, for the election of a member of the legislative assembly to fill any vacancy arising, subsequently to a general election, and before the first meeting of said assembly thereafter by reason of the death or other of the causes aforesaid, and the writ may issue at any time after such vacancy.

The journal of the legislature contains the following references to North Renfrew:—

THE SPEAKER NOTIFIED.

March 20.—Col. Matheson and Dr. Willoughby notify the Speaker of the death of J. W. Munro, M. L. A. for North Renfrew.

March 23.—The Speaker informed the House that he had received notification of a vacancy which had occurred since the general election in May last, and he asked the warrant to the Clerk for a new writ for election of a member to serve in the present legislature for the North Riding of the County of Renfrew.

March 31.—Motion by Col. Matheson, seconded by Thomas Crawford, that the House register the provisions of Section 37 of the act respecting representation of the people in the legislative assembly had not been complied with by the issue of a writ and that a direction be given that said writ be issued without further delay. Voted down by Government.

April 24.—Col. Matheson asked: Has the writ been issued to fill the vacancy in North Renfrew? If not, what was the cause of delay, and on what day did the Speaker issue his warrant? The Premier replied: The Speaker's warrant for the issue of the writ in North Renfrew was dated March 23, 1903. The Government has directed the Clerk not to issue the writ, pending the present investigation in re charges by the member for Manitoulin. On motion of Col. Matheson it was ordered that there be laid before the House a return of copies of all correspondence between any member of the Government and any other person or persons since the death of J. W. Munro, M. L. A., with reference to the issue of the writ for the election to fill the vacancy in North Renfrew. Not brought down.

Anthony S. Rowe's Case.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—The fate of Anthony Stanley Rowe is in the hands of Mr. Justice Britton, who will give judgment on his application for his release at Osgoode Hall to-day. Yesterday Mr. T. C. Robinette, K.C., made the last effort to save his client from being handed over to the English police. Rowe is charged with forgery and theft from the Great Fingall Consolidated Company of London, England, was committed for extradition by Magistrate Denison on October 19. Deputy Attorney-General Cartwright and Crown Attorney Curry appeared yesterday for the Crown, and Mr. C. W. Kerr for the Great Fingall Company. Inspector R. Sager of Scotland Yard arrived in the city yesterday to take Rowe back to England.

A Royal Betrothal.

London, Nov. 9.—It is said that King Edward has approved the engagement of Prince Alexander of Teck to Princess Alice of Albany.

GLORY WHALEN MURDER.

MAN ARRESTED AT COMBER SUSPECTED OF THE CRIME.

Mr. Richard McKee of Comber Informs the Windsor Police that He Believes a One-legged Negro is the Murderer.

Windsor, Nov. 10.—Richard McKee of Comber, yesterday telephoned Chief Wills of Windsor that he had discovered the slayer of Glory Whalen, who was brutally murdered at Collingwood three months ago. There is a reward of \$1,000 for the capture of her assailant. A one-legged colored man was arrested on the premises of McKee last week, and sentenced to serve six months in Sandwich jail on a charge of vagrancy. From conversations which Mr. McKee had with the prisoner he believes that he is none other than the man who is responsible for the murder of Glory Whalen. The prisoner will be brought to Windsor, accompanied by McKee. Chief Wills believes Mr. McKee is right in his conjecture that the fellow is the murderer.
