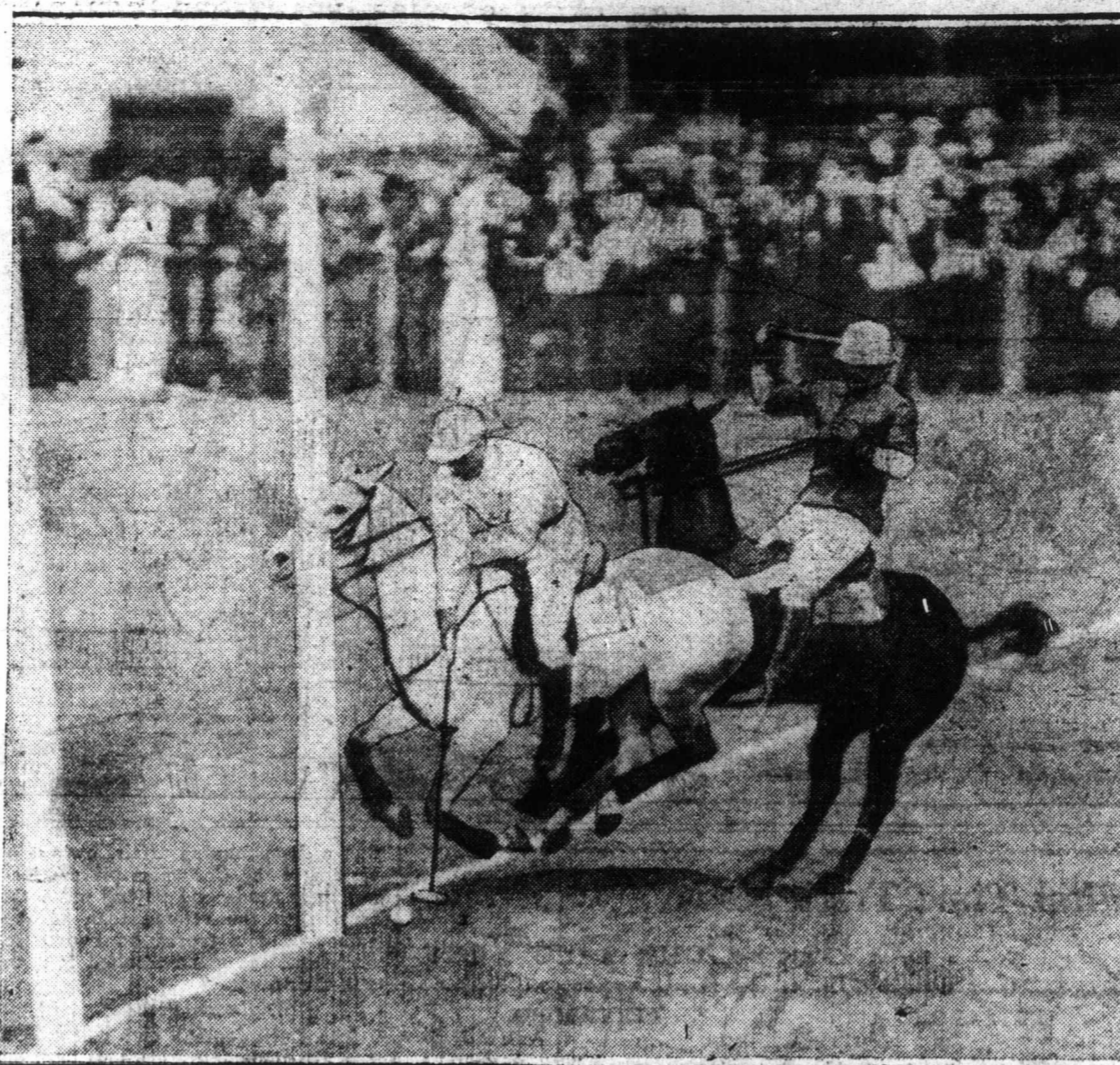

"SUWANEE RIVER" IN SONG BOOK

The popularity of "Suwanee River" dates back to the time when Christine Nilsson, the fair haired daughter of a farmer near Wexio, Sweden, surprised all who heard her with the sweetness and compass of her voice as she sang Foster's plaintive melody. She was an accomplished player on the flute and violin and she made her debut at the early age of 17 at Stockholm. Like many of the famous prima donnas, the opera chosen for her appearance was "La Traviata." She made a concert tour of the United States and sang many years in Italian opera. At her farewell concert given in London her voice was exquisite in its purity and sweetness and evenness of tone, having a compass of three octaves, an exceptional range. In America she will be known and long remembered for her singing of "Suwanee River" in the height of her success and operatic triumphs. She was the acknowledged incomparable artist of her times.
