THE FROBS Toronto, June 10.—The high area is now centered in Ontario and the western low one is advancing quickly towards the great lakes. Rain has been almost general in the western provinces, the heaviest falls being at Edmonton, Battleford and Minnedosa. The weather is unseasonably cool throughout the Dominion.

NEGOTIATIONS ARE NOW OFF Rome, June 10.—Germany has broken off negotiations for the exchange of wounded prisoners who are unfit for further military service, with all the belligerent countries. The exchange in Great Britain prisoners. Various pretexts for this action have been placed before the Vatican, such as possible use on semi-military duties of prisoners still in captivity. These have made the worst impression at the Vatican.

CREW IN TERRIBLE PLIGHT Hartlepool, England, June 10.—The crew of the trawler Velocity, which has been taken at sea by a German submarine, were landed here this morning after being 52 hours at sea in a small boat without food or water. The men were in a terrible state of exhaustion when they were picked up by the vessel which brought them to port. The submarine fired five shells at the Velocity to send her to the bottom.

FRENCH NOW HOLDING THE "LABYRINTH" Only a Fraction of it is Left in German Hands.

London, June 10.—Careful reading between the lines of the various official announcements of the last twelve hours leads British observers of the situation on the continent to the belief that the weary Russians have been successful in gaining a breathing space, along the eastern front. Furthermore evidence of the stubborn opposition which the Austro-Germans are said to be meeting near the center of the line in Galicia is declared here to exist in the statement from Petrograd that 2,000 Austro-German prisoners have been taken in a series of counter-attacks near Przemysl.

According to Russian reports the Austro-German offensive in Southeast Galicia has not been able to cross the River Dniester at any point other than Zurlawna, which is forty miles from Lemberg, and which they reached last Sunday. Berlin contradicts this with the statement that the right wing of the army under General Von Linsingen has advanced to 10 miles further and occupied Stanislaw, an important railroad center.

ONLY A FRACTION LEFT In the west the French make their usual report of slow progress accom-panied by the repulse of German counter-attacks. The French claim and Berlin admits that the French now are in occupation of entire vil-lage of Neuville, St. Vaast, which only a fraction of "The Labyrinth" is left in German hands. From other por-tions of the French front come re-ports of minor advances.

ITALIANS REPULSED According to Vienna, the efforts of the Italians to cross the River Isonzo, near Gorizia, have been repulsed after a serious engagement. It would appear evident that the Italians have met the first difficult problem of their invasion of Austria in this endeavor to cross the Isonzo, although they claim to have a foothold at some places on both banks.

The resignation of William Jen-nings Bryan as secretary of state, is still an absorbing topic of discussion with the English press. The text of the American note to Germany is awaited with great eagerness.

Paris, June 10.—3.30 p.m.—The French war office this afternoon is- sued a report on the progress of hos-tilities which reads as follows: "There was all last night a very violent engagement in the region be-tween Lorette and the sugar refinery at Souchez. At nine o'clock at night the enemy delivered an attack which was, however, at once repulsed. The Germans bombarded Neuville, St. Vaast, but they made no endeavor to capture it. We made further pro-gress yesterday in 'The Labyrinth'." "In the vicinity of Hebuterne we maintained all our advance on a front 1,800 yards long and for a depth of about 1,000 yards. There is nothing further to report from the remainder of the front." Experts blew the safe of a big Chicago druggists' plant and stole \$10,000 worth of drugs.
