WAITED ON LICENSE BOARD.

Among the deputations which yesterday waited upon the Ontario License board with regard to the selling of native wines by manufacturers

through agencies, was Major J. S. Hamilton of this city. It was pointed out to the board on behalf of the manufacturers that to require them to sell their goods at the place of manufacture would lead to the establishment of small manufacturers in the large centres with the consequent depreciation in the quality of product since the proper place to make the wine was as near to the grape fields as it was possible to get. The board gave the deputation no assurance, but

it is likely that some concession in this direction will be made. The License Board will not attempt to fix any limit upon the quantity of alcohol in native wines provided that it is present by the nature process of fermentation and is not added. The board takes the view that it was never contemplated that the section of the new act giving them power to regulate traffic in native wine, was to enable them to make native wine a "temperance" drink.
