Picture to yourselves a country where the ground rose and fell like a great wave of the sea, with a crest a foot high and was a width of three city blocks. As this ran across the city observers saw the houses in rows tumbling down, one after another, like the child's blocks, 'dobies substantial brick structures, stone car to come schools, churches, aid hospitals and public edifices. There were smaller shocks that completed the ruin, with Jittle tremblings running through the intervening months, and this is an important city. Everything in the way of public works was ruined, water mains were broken, and sewers disarranged. Then not least in the problem, there was lack of leadership in co-ordinated effort at re-

The loss of life was not great, a couple of hundred in all, but the people of the city were rendered omeless and were driven away from those places that were familiar to them. They huddled hastily in spots outside the city where there was room and waited for whatever help might be sent their way.

Guatemala has had no real census and vital statistics are an unknown quantity. The population of the state is approximately four millions and in the city there are about one hundred and twenty thousand with three-fifths of them Indians. The population is composite: Indians, natives who are a mixture of Spanish, Indian and negro; the upper classes, who are generally Spanish, and there are several thousand Germars. 
