Ottawa, June 10.—The revenue for May shows an increas of \$434,000, accounted for chiefly by an increase of \$180,000 in customs and of \$200,000 in excise, due to the ex-warehousing of spirits and sugar during the first three days of May, just prior to the tariff increases on May 3. The total revenue to date for the eleven months of the fiscal year falls short of the previous year by \$2,880,000. 
English, French and American Mission aries Slain at Cheng-Tu.
