# 16 SURVIVORS IN 154

Awful Death Toll of Wreck of Pacific Liner Valencia.

One of the Worst Marine Disasters of the Pacific Coast-Steamers Salvo and Czar Could Get No Neaner the Wrecked Valencia Than Three-Quarters of a Mile-Steamer Queen

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 25.—Only sixteen survivors of a total of 154 of the crew and passengers of the steamer Valen-cia is the sad record of one of the worst marine disasters on the Pacific

Coast.
The steamer Salvor has arrived from The steamer Salvor has arrived from the scene of the wreck at Klanaway Point, about five miles from Cape Beale, where the ship is lying with her stern high on the reef and her decks swept bare. At three-quarters of a mile no sign of a living person was discerned on board. In the rigging of the foremast was some dark huddled object, but whether a crude signal of distress or a niece of sail could not be distress or a piece of sail could not be ascertained.

The steamer Czar, after making as

close an examination as possible at three-quarters of a mile, which was the nearest that even she dare ap-

close an examination as possible at three-quarters of a mile, which was the nearest that even she dare approach the reef in the prevailing wind and sea, returned to the Salvor and Queen, the former heading for Bamfield, while the Queen stood by in the forlorn hope of picking up some castaway of bodies before relieved by the City of Topeka.

The 10 survivors, who are reported fifteen miles from Beale, reached that point via the difficult trail. So far as known they, with six in the boatswain's crew, 16 in all are all that are left of the crew of 60 and 94 passengers. When the Salvor left the locality of the wreck there was a strong southwest gale, and the rain was descending in torrents with cutting flurries of hail. The sole survivors are: T. J. McCarthy, boatswain; Thomas Lawson, C. Brown, Thomas Shields, John Mark, W. Goslin, C. J. Miller, fireman; Assistant Supt. Sunker of Seattle, whose wife and two daughters drowned; D.

Matos, the former adversary of President Castro, in the course of an interview published here yesterday, expressed the opinion that serious complications would not ensue from the present difficulties between France and Venezuela. He considered that President Castro has considered that President Castro has done great work for the pacification of Venezuela and held the complete confidence of the people, which would be strengthened if the country was persuaded that there was no possibility of a conflict with France. Matos believes that with the assistance of the United States war will be avoided. In case of hostilities, the general asserted, Venezuela could mobilize 100,000 men, but he was certain that an arrangement was near at hand.


