NEW TYPE OF CASE FOR EXPORT
APPLES

An Old Country paper gives the following account of a new type of box or "case", as it is termed in the British fruit trade, which is being tried out in the shipment of apples from Australia. "A new export case, the invention of an Australian, is being tried out in a shipment of 500 cases of apples now going forward from Melbourne to London, according to the Canadian Department of Trade and Commerce. The case is known as the "air free" case, and aims to solve the problems of ventilation and bruising. If the advantages claimed for the new case are evident in the experimental shipment, it will probably be largely used in future



ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 26—Winter unloaded snow on northeastern New York over the week-end, the fall ranging in depth from six inches to a foot and a half. Plattsburgh, Saratoga Lake and other Adirondack points temporarily were cut off from communication when the rain of Saturday turned to snow under a howling wind, bringing down wires and blocking roads. Car service was curtailed in Albany, telephone communication was interrupted and supplies of milk were brought into the city section with difficulty.

Motor trucks and automobiles were stalled in deep drifts south of Schenecctady.

The snow began drifting last night.
Railroads were preparate and fighting equipment and a tie-up of both rail and highway traffic was generally expected in the morning.

EVERY SEAT SOLD FOR OLYMPIC

PARIS, NOV. 26—The French Olympic Games Committee already has hung up the "standing room only" sign at the Colombes Stadium, although the official opening of the 1924 Olympic Games is still seven months away.

The stadium provides accommodation for 70,000 spectators. There will be 20,000 reserved seats, divided evenly among the two covered stands on each side of the track, known as "Official", and the "Marathon" stands. The remaining fifty thousand persons will be accommodated with standing room at both ends of the bowl and at the turns. The British and United States Olympic committees have requested five thousand seats for spectators from these countries, while Sweden and Italy have each requested 1500 seats. The remaining 7,000 seats have virtually all been reserved by the small nations, leaving hardly any for the French committee to dispose of to French sport lovers.



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College Girls' FEET GROWING

Columbus, O., Nov. 23—The feet of the modern college girl are steadily increasing in size, according to Miss Lydia Clark, head of the women's department of physical education at Ohio State University.

Miss Clark says that modern clothes and the great interest shown by themodern co-ed in outdoor activities are causes for the increase in size.

Not only are their feet increasing in size, but statistics show that the increase is general. Figures from Vassar, Smith and Leland Stanford show that the average weight of the college woman has increased from 123.8 pounds to 125.8, and that the waistline has increased on an average of 1.3 inches, Miss Clark says.
