\$10,000,000 Locomotive

Order From Belgium

BOSTON, Sept. 15.—The locomotive
order which is under negotiation by
American Locomotive with the Bel-
gian Government runs nearer \$10,000,
000 than the \$20,000,000 currently re-
ported. The main factor in the ne-
gotiations is, of course, method of
payment, which in the final analysis
resolves itself into the problem of
just how long credits can be extended.

If American Locomotive secures
this new export order it will mean
a total of some \$20,000,000 forward
business on its books, sufficient to
ensure operations at the present rate
of 50-60 per cent. capacity into 1920.
Since the issuance of the big loco-
motive company's report there has
been much dwelling upon the pau-
city of orders on hand. The point
is made by equipment men that the
situation is not so bad as it is painted
for the reason that the war is over
and that the days of tremendous
buying are over. From now on
American Locomotive will probably
get its orders, from abroad and at
home, in modest amounts.

The need for equipment, however,
is so great that buying is bound to
materialise and it is of small conse-
quence whether it comes all at once
or whether it is spread out over a
considerable period of time.

The Strike Issues

LONDON, Sept. 30 (Renter's)—
The overwhelming majority of the
public has not yet grasped the issues
in the strike, and consequently the
newspapers are giving prominence to
these. It may be worth while sum-
marizing the position again. The
railwaymen demand that every work-
er except the firemen and drivers who
have no grievance, shall receive as
permanent standard wages the 33
shillings weekly which was given as
a flat war wage, plus the highest rate
paid before the war in their respec-
tive grades, with a minimum of sixty
shillings weekly. The Government
offer that the new rates shall be one
hundred per cent. above war rates
with a minimum of 40 shillings week-
ly, that the difference between these
new rates and present earnings shall
be maintained until the cost of living
has fallen to 110 per cent. over the
pre-war figure. (When the afore-
mentioned war wage was awarded
the cost of living was 125 per cent.
above pre-war, now it is 115 per cent.)
That is and when the cost of living
has fallen to 110 per cent, the res-
idue of the war wage shall still be
paid until the cost of living has re-
mained at or below that level for
three months and even then the res-
idue of the war wage shall not fall
off in a lump but shall be readjusted
either by a sliding scale or by refer-
ence to an independent industrial
tribunal. The difference between the
demand and the offer may be briefly
illustrated: The railwaymen demand
that a man who received 18 shillings
weekly before the war and now re-
ceives with the aforementioned a
war wage of 51 shillings weekly, shall
in future have a minimum wage of
sixty shillings weekly. The Govern-
ment offers the 18 shillings man a
minimum of 40 shillings, plus 11
shillings residue of war wage until
December 31 and thereafter until the
cost of living has appreciably and
permanently fallen. Then the 11
shillings may be reduced gradually in
proportion to a further fall in the
cost of living. Some of the labor
correspondents are urging the Gov-
ernment to make it clear that the
forty shillings shall be guaranteed as
a permanent minimum. It is expect-
ed an official statement will be issued
in this regard shortly.

Pres. Wilson Is Better

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—President
Wilson, after two days of quiet and
rest at the White House, showed fur-
ther improvement today.

Lord Beatty's Remark

LONDON, Sept. 30.—Admiral Lord
Beatty, speaking at Kirkcaldy, said
he had noticed that the railwaymen's
leaders had congratulated the men
on their loyalty to the union. Ad-
miral Beatty remarked that it seemed
to him loyalty required a much broad-
er interpretation.
