



NEW COMPANY AT FLORENCEVILLE

B. F. Smith and J. B. Daggett Interests Are United and Dr. MacIntosh Joins

The announcement is made this week of the incorporation of a new company that will be known as the B. F. Smith, Ltd., and will be an amalgamation of the interests of B. F. Smith and J. B. Daggett & Co. The head office will be at East Florenceville, and the authorized capital is \$49,000. Under the act of incorporation, the company are empowered to deal in farm produce, farm machinery, automobiles, gasoline engines, etc., to carry on general farming, and to build and operate butter and cheese factories.

The following is the personnel of the company: B. F. Smith, Harry G. Smith and I. N. Tompkins of East Florenceville, Roy Hunter of Bath, L. DeC. MacIntosh of Hartland and J. B. Daggett of Fredericton. At a meeting of the company recently held at Florenceville the following were elected as officers: J. B. Daggett, president; H. G. Smith, vice-president; Roy Hunter, secretary-treasurer; B. F. Smith, local manager; directors, J. B. Daggett, B. F. Smith, H. G. Smith, Roy Hunter and L. DeC. MacIntosh. It is their intention to establish produce warehouses along the

line of the C. P. R. and Valley railroads for the handling of potatoes, turnips, hay and all farm produce.

Mending the Roads

Critics of the provincial government, especially those who discuss repair of the roads, will perhaps bear in mind the fact that the government has been in office only five months, of which at least three were quite unfit for roadwork. In other words, the department of Hon. Mr. Veniot has had not more than two months of really fit weather for good work on the roads, and yet their are some critics unfair enough to find fault because in two months he has not removed all traces everywhere of the nine years of neglect which brought the roads to such a state of disrepair. Those who are fair-minded enough to give credit where credit is due are reporting a great improvement in the state of the roads, as a result of the systematic repair work done to as large an extent as possible in so short a time and under the exceptional conditions in regard to weather and labor which have prevailed this year. Hon. Mr. Veniot does not hesitate to say that the roads are bad. He knows it, for he has been steadily on the job, inspecting them for himself and arranging for as much repair as possible this year in the worst places. The Times ventures to predict that before the present legislature has lived out its term there will be a very marked improvement in the roads, all over the province. Meanwhile let it not be forgotten that the Foster government has only been in office five months, of which only two afforded good weather for work on the roads, after an exceptionally wet spring and early summer. POTATOES MAY SELL FOR \$1.25

Is the Prediction of a Well Known Shipper

"The New Brunswick potato crop is excellent this year," was the optimistic statement made by F. G. Scott, of the New Brunswick Potato Exchange to the Montreal Star the other morning. The potato crop was good everywhere in fact, he said, and the United States government predicted a surplus of a million bushels. Prices were bound to be low, and would likely rule between \$1 and \$1.50 per 90 lb. bag. The estimate of \$1.25 made by a member of the food commission, he considered very fair.

Last year's soaring market would not be repeated this year, he said. Canadian prices followed American prices last winter, but this year the United States would rely on its own production, and consequently there would be no demand for Canadian potatoes. There was no export to Great Britain which reduced the foreign demand to Cuba and the West Indies. Shipping to these points would begin in October and continue until the weather was too cold to handle them. Prices at the present time were fictitious and a lower level was looked for as soon as shipping began in quantity. Potatoes were still too small to be marketed except for immediate use.

Apples would probably be dear, said Mr. Scott, in spite of expectations to the contrary earlier in the season. Producers in the maritime provinces looked for difficulty in finding a market when the embargo was placed on Canadian apples. The Ontario crop is pronounced practically a failure which leaves the lower province production as the sole supply of the Canadian market.

"Prices vary from \$6 to \$8 a barrel today," Mr. Scott concluded, "and from the present outlook they will stay there."
