Newcastle Will Bring Two Actions Against County for Two Small Sums.

NEWCASTLE COUNCIL AFTER COUNTY'S SCALP

It is All Because County Council
Refused To Pay Two Small
Bills.

Ald. Morrison Says Citizen Cannot
Retain His Self Respect And
Serve on Wharf Com

The Newcastle Town Council and the Municipal Council appear to be at logger heads. As a consequence the Town will shortly begin two suits against the County. At Monday evening's meeting of the Town Council, Ald. Morrison reporting as the representative of the Council at the session of the Municipal Council stated that there were two matters in which the Mayor and Aldermen would be interested. The first was a bill of \$2 which the Town submitted to the County for repaying an approach to the County Secretary's office in 1902. The repairs were ordered by the late Mr. Thomson and were made by the Town Road Commissioner. The bill was before the County Council last year and sent back to this year when it was rejected on the ground that the crossing was not on County property. Ald. Morrison went on to say that the Town had no right to build approaches to County property and that the Town's legal adviser had no hesitation in saying that the County could be made to pay it. "One argument advanced by the County," said Ald. Morrison, "was that Mr. Thomson was not authorized to have the work done." He showed how ridiculous this contention was and wanted to know if a window in the office were broken or the door smashed in would Mr. Thomson have been compelled to get authority before they could be fixed.

On motion of Ald. Morrison the Town Clerk was authorized to take action against the County to recover the amount. Ald. Morrison stated that the County had also turned down the Town's account for lighting the public wharf. Early last summer the Public Wharf Committee asked the town to name the lower figure that two 32 candle power lights would be placed on the wharf during the season of navigation. The council offered to supply them for \$5 a light and the offer was accepted and the lights duly established. Ald. Morrison went on to say that the Council refused to pay the bill on the ground that the Wharf Committee had exceeded their authority.

On motion of Ald. Taylor the Town Clerk was authorized to take action against the County to recover the amount. Ald. Morrison said in effect that no citizen of Newcastle could become a member of the Public Wharf Committee and retain his self respect if he were aware of the statements made about the committee by members of the County Accounts Committee.

Committee Declares Public Wharf
Is Run In The Interest Of
Individuals.

WHARF COM. UNDER FIRE

Council Passes Resolution Favor-

ESTIMATES FOR YEAR.

The County Council which closed its session here on Friday afternoon did not seem disposed to honor the accounts submitted by the town of Newcastle. Two accounts were rejected altogether. In connection with one or two accounts the Public Wharf committee were subjected to rather severe strictures.

At Friday's session of the Council there was considerable discussion on public wharf accounts and it was decided to appoint one committee in each parish to look after the matter. Only five public wharves had taken out licenses when there were doubtless two hundred doing business.

Scott Act Inspector Mendie submitted his annual report. Twenty prosecutions were commenced during the year resulting in fourteen convictions.

The Scott Act committee in their report stated that they considered the Inspector's traveling account, \$225.11 as exorbitant and recommended that it be cut down to \$150. The committee reported that \$1025.65 was the amount of expenses in the prosecution of the cases and the revenue amounted to \$709.50. There was a deficit of \$455.55.

The committee's report was adopted. Coun. Davidson submitted the resignation of Jas. A. Rundle as a member of the Public Wharf committee. Coun. Davidson said that at a former session of the County Accounts committee of which his colleague was a member, had made a recommendation in reference to an account incurred by the public wharf committee which which was a gross injustice to the committee and before making a motion he would like to have an explanation from Coun. Morrison as to his part in this matter.

The report referred to was one in reference to repairs made to public wharf in which a quantity of refuse deal and spikes were used. The committee in their recommendation suggested that in future one Public Wharf committee use merchantable hemlock and buy spikes by the keg. They did not understand how the labor on laying 12,000 feet deals could be \$72. They thought the Public Wharf was run in the interest of individuals rather than in the interest of the county.

Coun. Morrison said that he was not aware that this report was placed on this account until his attention was called to it by another Councillor. He was at the county offices at the time on committee work and did not see the account before it was presented to the Council. He thought that the Accounts Committee should have obtained some information on this account before making such a recommendation which reflected on these gentlemen's actions. This Public Wharf Committee composed of Messrs. Jas. A. Rundle, J. H. Phinney and Ed. Hickey was a very efficient one and had faithfully performed the duty of that committee for a number of years. The account referred to was from D. and J. Ritchie & Co. for material and labor in repairing Public Wharf. One of the items which the Accounts Committee took exception to was that for labor in repairing wharf. In explanation he might say that the Public Wharf Committee finding that this work was necessary, requested the loan of Messrs. Ritchie's men, who were experienced in wharf building, and the amount paid them was for other work besides laying deals. The blocks had to be repaired and posts fixed.

DESIRE ASSOCIATION THAT'LL INCLUDE ALL GUIDES.

Many of The New Brunswick
Guides Dissatisfied With Pres-
ent Association.

NOT REPRESENTATIVE.

Arthur Pringle, Here, Gives Denial
To Stories Circulated About
Guides Association.

Among many of the guides of New Brunswick there is a motion in favoring the formation of a new guides association. It is pointed out that the New Brunswick Guides Association is not representative of the guides of the Province, being composed almost entirely of York County men, who send on misleading pamphlets with the chief object of making Fredericton the supply depot for the big game hunters. Newcastle, Campbellton and Bathurst are entirely ignored. What is wanted is an Association controlled by the government and with the Survey General or Chief Game Commissioner at its head. The idea would be to include every guide in the Province and to compel each one to take out a license for which they would have to pay merely a nominal fee.

The formation of an Association of this kind would preclude the diffusion of false and misleading statements and place all supply stations on their merits. The matter will likely be brought to the attention of the government at an early date.

Mr. Arthur Pringle, president of the New Brunswick Guides Association was here last week and to a reporter for the Advocate gave an emphatic denial to the story that the New Brunswick Guides Association were seeking legislation to prevent guides outside of the Association from guiding. Mr. Pringle said that the Association never entertained such a proposition for a moment.

Mr. Pringle expressed his willingness to support any legislation which would include all the guides.
