

NOMINATIONS IN WEST HAMILTON.

character, whom we can vote for and feel that we are doing right.

Mr. Cameron, who nominated the Socialist candidate, declared that the Socialist party went into the fight expecting defeat, but every defeat, he declared, was only an incentive to greater things, and no discouragement to socialism.

Mr. Armstrong, the candidate, made a bitter attack on capitalism, and appealed for an overthrow of the wage system. Regarding the Hydro-Power proposition, he said, favored municipal ownership, but not in this way, for the rich would get the benefit of the cheaper power, and the whole public had to pay for it.

Col. Hendrie speaks. Col. Hendrie began speaking at ten minutes past 1 o'clock, and was given a fair reception. It gave him the greatest pleasure, he said, to appear before the electors and ask for the support of the Government, which had fulfilled its pledges.

In the kindest way he wished to refer to a statement made by his opponent, who started out by asking that there be no personalities. Some statements were made on a platform here, however, said the colonel, which he could not overlook.

One of these was the statement Mr. Wardrop made that the Whitney Government had done nothing for primary education. He declared Whitney had increased the grants for the benefit of the common schools over \$329,000, compared with the expenditure made by the Ross Government.

Col. Hendrie attempted a defence of the Normal College, stating that a non-partisan commission had reported in favor of centralization. The whole Normal School, he said, consisted of one principal, and they borrowed teachers from the schools, to the detriment of the public schools, to educate teachers. He referred to the new Normal School being built in West Hamilton, at a cost of \$90,000, and three times the amount of money would be spent in maintaining it, as compared with the college in East Hamilton.

Regarding the dismissal of officials, he said: "Sir Oliver Mowat said that to carry out the license law you must have officials in sympathy with the Government. We found few in sympathy. In many cases license inspectors were dismissed. They were not in Hamilton, although they were on grounds for dismissing some of the officials here. I think it is unfair to charge us with that, though, when you cannot point to one dismissal in Hamilton."

The colonel said that in appointing K. C.'s, he had appointed two Hamilton Liberals, one of these being his opponent in the last election. Dealing with prison labor, Colonel Hendrie said his stand on this question had not changed from the last election. He had promised then to do all he could to have it abolished. When the Government assumed control he found most of the contracts running out, and they had to have work for the prisoners. He said the Central Prison would shortly be done away with, and the whole system re-arranged, the prison being put in the country, where the prisoners would be engaged at farm labor.

The speaker dealt at length with the Government's record on other lines. Mr. Wardrop began his address after 2 o'clock.

NOT IMPOSTERS.

One day last week an item appeared in the city papers to the effect that two sisters of the Catholic Church in this city, the two sisters called at the Times this morning and showed their credentials, a letter from Bishop Salford, of Manchester, England, endorsed by Archbishop Farley, archbishop of the United States. They came to the city to raise funds for a hospital for working girls, in Manchester, but, not getting the sanction of Bishop Dowling, did not canvass in Hamilton or vicinity. They are guests of a personal friend, Miss Sullivan, 275 King street east, and have received subscriptions to their fund, unsolicited, from a few friends. They do not desire to raise money here in opposition to the wishes of the bishop, but they feel that Hamilton people should know that they are working in a worthy cause and are not imposters.


