

Dismissals of Employees.

(Special Despatch to the Times.). Kingston, Ont., May 27 .- The facts are made public for the first time since the perpetration of the crime of a second daring and skilful robbery of a' car, running between Ottawa and To-ronto. In the first robbery several weeks ago packages of bills to the amount of \$25,000, consigned from Ottawa to To-ronto, were lost at some place in transit between those two points. In this latest robbery, however, an even larger am-ount than this was taken, the exact sum being unobtainable, but it is learned that the package contained gold and ne-gotiable bills aggregating \$25,000. Both robberies have occurred on the night run, and there are apparently no clues to the robbers. Several messengers and others have been dismissed.
