HAY.—There is a moderate demand and prices are as last week. We now quote prime Eastern hay at \$27 to \$27 1/2 per ton. Straw \$27 per ton. OATS.—Prices are steady. We now quote at 60 to 65 cents per bushel. PROVISIONS.—There is a moderate demand for small lots of provisions, and prices exhibit a tendency downwards. No alteration in prices of the whole sale. Lard, 20 cts. per lb.; tallow, 12 cts. per lb.; sugar, 20 cts. per lb.; coffee, 25 cts. per lb.; tea, 15 cts. per lb.; rice, 12 cts. per lb.; flour, 12 cts. per bushel. HALLAM, Dec. 10.
